who are in regular standing, and have not violated the Codes of Ethics of the American Medical Association and the Medical Society of the State of New York.

"No person duly authorized to practise physic and surgery shall be allowed to disclose any information which he may have acquired in attending any patient in a professional character, and which information was necessary to enable him to prescribe for such patient as a physician, or to do any act for him as a surgeon."—*Revised Statutes* (N. Y.)

SEC. 3. It is derogatory to the dignity of the profession to resort to public advertisements, or private cards or handbills, inviting the attention of individuals affected with particular diseases, publicly offering advice and medicine to the poor gratis, or promising radical cures; or to publish cases and operations in the daily prints, or suffer such publications to be made; to invite laymen to be present at operations; to boast of cures and remedies; to adduce certificates of skill and success, or to perform any other similar acts. These are the ordinary practices of empirics, and are highly reprehensible in a regular physician.—*Code of Medical Ethics adopted by the American Medical Association*, pp. 16, 17. New York: William Wood & Co. 1867.

The importance of the medical profession requires that it should be exercised with fidelity to its scientific principles and approved doctrines, with honor to all its members, and with justice and humanity to the sick. A departure from the above principles constitutes

QUACKERY,

which degrades the medical character by ignorance, artifice, unapproved methods of practice, and by the use of remedies dangerous to life.

IV. Any physician or surgeon who divides his responsibility with a known quack, and associates with him in consultations, receiving a fee or the usual charges for such services, or practices with nostrums, secret medicines or patent remedies, is guilty of quackery.—*Laws and By-Laws of the Medical Society of the State of New York, etc.*, pp. 32, 33. Albany. 1857.

Resolved, That advertisements indicating location and residence are the utmost limits of self-announcement consistent with professional dignity, and that all reference to special branches of medical science, as extra inducements to patronage, should be deemed a violation of the Code of Medical Ethics.

Resolved, That hereafter any medical practitioner so offending shall be disqualified as a delegate to or for membership of this Society; and if already a delegate to, or a member thereof, shall be deemed a fit subject for discipline.—*Transactions of the Medical Society of the State of New York for the year 1865*, p. 334.

Resolved, That private handbills, addressed to members of the medical profession, or in medical journals, or cards calling the attention of professional brethren to themselves as assistants, be declared in violation of the Code of the American Medical Association.

Resolved, That the proper construction of Art. IV., Code of Ethics, American

Medical Association, having been called for relative to consultation with irregular practitioners who are graduates of regular schools: therefore,
Resolved. That Art. IV., Sec. 1, Code of Ethics, *excludes all mal-practitioners* from recognition by the regular profession.—*Adopted at Twentieth Annual Meeting American Medical Association, May 5, 1869.*



MEDICAL ASSOCIATIONS.

American Medical Association.

Organized in New York City, May 5, 1846, as the National Medical Convention. Reorganized and name changed May 5, 1847. First annual meeting at Baltimore, May 2, 1848.

Composed of permanent members and delegates. Each local medical society in good standing may send one delegate for every ten of its resident members, and one for every additional fraction of more than half this number. The faculty of every regularly constituted medical college or chartered school of medicine, and the professional staff of every chartered or municipal hospital containing a hundred inmates or more, are privileged to send two delegates; but every other permanently organized medical institution in good standing is limited in its representation to one delegate. The medical departments of the United States army and navy are each entitled to four delegates, appointed by the chiefs of their respective bureaus.

Permanent members, who are entitled to all the privileges of the Association except voting, consist of all those who have served in the capacity of delegates and of such other members as may have been appointed by unanimous vote.

Its meetings are held annually on the first Tuesday in May or June, and each delegate holds his appointment for one year. The place and time are determined by vote.

The annual dues (\$5) are to be paid before taking a seat as delegate. The twenty-second volume of the transactions—Philadelphia, Collins, printer, 705 Jayne street, 1871—has been published.

**The New York Society for the Relief of Widows and Orphans of
Medical Men.**

Instituted November 26, 1842. Incorporated April 18, 1843.

Annual members pay an initiation fee of \$10, and \$10 dues in semi-annual payments. Any person paying \$100 at one time becomes a member for life, and \$150 or upwards a benefactor. Applications for membership received at the quarterly meetings of the Board of Managers, and at the anniversary dinner, which is usually served in November.

PERSONS ENTITLED TO RELIEF.

SECTION 1. The following persons are entitled to receive assistance annually from the funds of the Society, in such amounts and manner as the Board of Managers shall direct :

1. The widow of a member who has no income from invested property or other fixed provision exceeding five hundred dollars per annum, provided that if said widow shall marry again her annuity shall cease, unless otherwise ordered by a three-fourths vote of the Board of Managers.

2. Children of a member being, if males, under sixteen, and if females' under eighteen years of age and unmarried, and wholly or in part dependent upon the mother for support, and said mother having not more than one hundred dollars per annum income from invested property or other fixed provision for each child respectively, in addition to the five hundred dollars above mentioned.

3. Orphans of a member being, if males, under sixteen, and if females, under eighteen years of age and unmarried, who have no income from invested property or other fixed provision exceeding two hundred dollars per annum.

SEC. 2. In special cases the widowed mother or aged sister of a deceased member, who had been dependent upon said member for support, may receive assistance at the discretion of the Board of Managers, or a three-fourths vote of the members present.

SEC. 3. In cases of prolonged ill health, or other extraordinary circumstances, the assistance granted to the surviving children of members may be extended beyond the limits of sixteen and eighteen years respectively by a three-fourths vote of the Board of Managers:

SEC. 4. The marriage of the widow of a member shall not invalidate the claims of the children of said member to assistance from the Society.

SEC. 5. No one shall be entitled to claim assistance from the Society

unless the person by virtue of whose membership the claim is made had been a member for the two years previous to his death.

Organized January 7, 1847. Incorporated June 23, 1851.

"Una fides, altare commune."

Composed of resident, non-resident, corresponding and honorary fellows. Initiation fee and annual dues, each \$5.

Each candidate for resident fellowship must be a graduate or licentiate in medicine, residing in this city or county, or in either of the counties of this State thereunto adjoining, for three years, and must be proposed in writing by three fellows personally acquainted with him, and may be elected by a three-fourths vote at any subsequent stated meeting.

The number of corresponding fellows is limited to one hundred, who must be men of eminence and actively engaged in the cultivation of medical science. Honorary fellows must be citizens of the United States, and have been long distinguished in their profession. Their number is limited to fifty.

The objects of the Academy are: 1st. The cultivation of the science of medicine; 2d. The advancement of the character and honor of the profession; 3d. The elevation of the standard of medical education; 4th. The promotion of the public health.

The Academy reserves the right of reprimand, suspension or expulsion for violation of its regulations or of its code of medical ethics, as well as the power to revoke for cause the certificate of fellowship granted every member. It may also publish said revocation in the public journals in case the holder refuses to surrender the certificate, and will recognize no fellow as a regular practitioner who has been expelled.

Every duly admitted resident fellow shall affix his signature to the constitution and by-laws within two months after his election; and in default thereof said election shall be deemed void, unless a satisfactory excuse be given; nevertheless he may be renominated and re-elected.

The president, vice-president, recording secretary, corresponding secretary, treasurer, the five trustees, together with the chairman of the standing committees, constitute the council.

In addition to the above officers there are a librarian, a statistical and assistant recording secretary, all of whom are appointed by the council.

Stated sessions first and third Thursdays in each month, at eight o'clock P. M., in the hall of the College of Physicians and Surgeons.

Anniversary meeting first Thursday in November. Nominations for

officers, first stated meeting in December, and election first stated meeting in January.

New York Physicians' Mutual Aid Association.

Organized June 27, 1868. Incorporated November 30, 1868.

The object of the Association shall be to afford pecuniary aid to the widows and children of its deceased members (defined in the charter of this Society as the "widows and heirs" of deceased members), or in the absence of both of these, to parents, brothers and sisters (previously dependent on them), by such assessments as shall be required by the charter and by-laws.

Pecuniary aid may be furnished to its sick members, in cases of special need, out of the interest of the permanent fund.

As soon as the permanent fund shall amount to the sum of ten thousand dollars, aid may also be rendered to the widow (during her widowhood) of a deceased member, and his children, under fourteen years of age, out of the proceeds of said fund.

Any regular member of the medical profession of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens, Richmond and Westchester, in good health and in actual practice, or teacher or professor in a medical school, under seventy years of age, may be admitted a member of this Association, after a ballot, five affirmative votes of the trustees being required. The treasurer, upon being informed of the death of any member, levies an assessment of one dollar from those admitted under fifty years of age, and two dollars from those admitted over fifty years of age. "All assessments after the first must be paid within thirty days after the notification of the death of the last deceased member, under the penalty of forfeiture of membership."

Any member being informed of a sick and destitute member, shall refer his case to the committee on benevolence, which, after due examination, shall be reported to the board of trustees, and if in their opinion, it is one entitled to the benefactions of the Association, they, the trustees, are authorized to make appropriations in his behalf;* and in case of his death, contribute to the payment of his funeral expenses, out of the proceeds of the permanent fund. They are also authorized to make appropriations to the widow of a deceased member, and his children, under fourteen years of age, in like circumstances of need.

Whenever the above described case shall terminate in the death of a member, the appropriations made and the expenses incurred shall be

* The member may, at his option, be taken to either of the following hospitals, viz.: The New York, German, St. Luke's, Mount Sinai, Roosevelt, Presbyterian, of New York, or the Brooklyn City Hospital, and the Long Island College Hospital of Brooklyn, to avail himself of the comforts and attendance provided by this Association through the kindness of the several hospitals. Like favor has also been granted by the New York Eye and Ear Infirmary, the Manhattan Eye and Ear Hospital, and the Brooklyn Eye and Ear Hospital.

deducted from his interest in the Association, and be returned to the permanent fund, and the balance paid as directed in Article II., Sec. 1, and Article IX. But in case of his recovery, the amount of said appropriation, without interest, shall stand as a lien against his interest in this Association, which, after his decease, shall be first satisfied, and the balance paid as in Article II., Sec. 1, and Article IX.

Annual meeting, when officers are elected, the first Saturday in November. Special meetings may be called by a requisition in writing upon the president by ten members, or by five votes of the board of trustees. Initiation fee, \$2.

The New York Association for Improving the Condition of the Poor.

BIBLE HOUSE, ROOM 59, THIRD FLOOR, ENTRANCE ON EIGHTH STREET,
NEW YORK.

Organized 1843. Incorporated December 11, 1848.

The city is divided into twenty-two districts, corresponding to the wards, and the districts subdivided into sections, three hundred and sixty-nine in all. Each district has an advisory committee of five, and each section a visitor. The visitors carefully investigate all cases referred to them by members before granting relief, which, except with the consent of the advisory committee, or a member thereof, is not in money, but in "such articles of food, fuel, and similar supplies as may be necessary."

Among the objects of the Association are the discouragement of indiscriminate almsgiving, the provision of aid for worthy families who may be temporarily distressed but disposed to depend on their own exertions for support, and the elevation of the moral and physical condition of the poor. Should the visitor not be found, send the applicant to the office in the Bible House.

St. Luke's Association of St. Mark's Church in the Bowerie, N. Y.

Organized 1863.

The object of the Association is to aid and care for the sick and poor within the limits of St. Mark's parish, and to help others who are needy and deserving.

Society of St. Vincent de Paul.

This Society is divided into conferences, which are attached to the various Catholic churches throughout the city. The person needing relief makes application at the residence of the pastor of the parish in which he or she resides. The application is given then to one of the general visitors of the conference, who calls on the applicant, and, if deserved, temporary relief is given. The conferences hold weekly meetings, at which the visiting committee report on the merits of the cases presented for relief. If the report be favorable, each applicant is committed to the care of a member of the conference, whose special duty it becomes to visit those intrusted to him at least once in each week, and oftener if the necessities of the case demand it, until such time as the applicant has secured means for obtaining a livelihood.

Hebrew Benevolent Fuel Association.

The object of the Association is the distribution of fuel to needy Hebrew persons.

The Sisters of the Strangers.

The intent of this association is to give help of every practical kind to those who are strangers—money help when needed, and when there is anything in the treasury; but also help otherwise. It cares for the indigent sick; it tries to put strangers in the way of obtaining employment; it gives the address of good boarding-houses, and seeks and furnishes reliable information of every department in which a stranger, rich or poor, may be interested. If he be in trouble, proper legal advice is secured promptly. Eminent clergymen, lawyers, physicians, and surgeons, the very first in their professions, give help gratuitously and whenever called upon. There is a pleasant room, to which strangers are welcome every day, except Sunday, from ten A. M. to twelve M., and from two to four P. M., and where they may read or converse, or write letters.

The organization is supported by subscriptions and donations.

STATISTICS.

During the year ending January 1, 1872, \$1,897.48 were disbursed, and 308 persons relieved.

Children's Aid Society.

The resources of the Society have been greatly reduced during the present year. There are 9,429 children on the rolls of the twenty-one schools under the direction of the Society, with an average attendance of 2,847. At the Newsboys' Lodging House there have been supplied with lodgings 53,005 persons; with meals, 53,214. At the Girls' Lodging House there have been 10,439 lodgings furnished, and 24,485 meals; whole number of girls, 1,189. At the Eighteenth Street Lodging House, number of lodgings furnished, 28,302; number of meals supplied, 30,693; whole number of boys, 750. At the Rivington Street Lodging House, number of lodgings furnished, 25,479; number of meals supplied, 35,097; whole number of boys, 604. Eleventh Ward Lodging House, number of lodgings furnished, 14,353; number of meals supplied, 14,240; whole number of boys, 550. As many as 3,386 persons have been sent to the West from the emigration department of the Society during the nine months. The total number provided for now swells to 24,000.

The institution is not a place of punishment, or a prison, but a reform school, where the inmates receive such instruction and training as are best adapted to form and perpetuate a virtuous character; to establish habits of industry, and advance them in those branches of knowledge which are taught in the common schools of the State; has provision for seven hundred and fifty boys and two hundred and fifty girls. Being a State institution, it receives, upon the warrant of commitment from a police magistrate or justice of the peace, any child under sixteen years of age complained of under oath by parent, guardian or representative of either as being disorderly. Boys from the following counties, namely: City and County of New York, Counties of Richmond, Suffolk, Queens, Kings, Westchester, Orange, Rockland, Putnam, Dutchess, Columbia, Sullivan, Ulster, Greene, Albany, Schoharie and Rensselaer; and girls from all parts of the State.

In the case of the remote counties the State allows a fixed compensation to be paid to the officers for the conveyance of the juvenile delinquents to the House.

Visitors admitted on all days from nine A. M. to five P. M. Parents, guardians and other near friends of those children sent from the cities of New York and Brooklyn are permitted to visit them once in three months, and on their first visit will receive a card designating these periods. Where friends reside at a distance from the city they will be permitted to see their children at any time they are in the city, provided their visits are not oftener than once in three months. If unable, from residing at too great a distance, to visit their children, they will be permitted to write to them once within the prescribed period and to receive letters in return.

In case of serious illness of any child the friends will be at once advised of its condition.

Infants under two years old not received. Inmates provided for gratuitously, except those intrusted to the care of the institution by a surviving parent or guardian, who, by the weekly payment of seventy-five cents, may withdraw them at the age of twelve. Full orphans are indentured at the same age.

Employers are required to give information regarding those in-

dentured to them, and to provide schooling for three months a year during the first four years of the apprenticeship.

This institution, being sustained by a fund bequeathed by John G. Leake, Esq., who died in 1827, receives no board from any inmate.

The requisites for admission are a written application (addressed to the superintendent) from any respectable citizen, accompanied by the statement that the child, who must be between the ages of three and twelve years, is a full orphan in destitute circumstances, and a certificate from some regular physician that the child is neither diseased nor deformed, and that he is mentally sound and capable of education. Every application is subject to the final decision of the attending physician.

The orphans are kept in the institution until their fourteenth year, when they are indentured to trades or surrendered to relatives.

Accessible by Hudson River Railroad landing at Fort Washington Depot. Take cars at Tenth avenue and Thirtieth street. In summer by steamboat from Peck Slip to Harlem, and by steamboat again from Harlem to High Bridge. By Third and Eighth avenue horse cars, connecting with the Bloomingdale and Manhattanville cars.

Visitors upon inmates received the last Thursday of each month. Personal friends, and those interested in the workings of the Asylum, at any time. Address letters for Asylum "Station M, New York." Business letters to "House of Reception."

Managed by a board of twenty-four directors, and designed as a reformatory for vicious children of both sexes, belonging to New York City, and between the ages of five and fifteen years.

Connected with the institution are a house, office, and two indenturing agents in Chicago, Ill., to facilitate the proper disposal of children sent from the city.

The board have also adopted the plan of employing a local agent to visit children discharged from the Asylum, with a view of still further extending their influence.

The requisites of admission are a commitment by a magistrate, or a surrender from the parent or guardian, evidence being required in either case that the children are in the condition specified, and entitled to the care and support of the institution. The House of Reception is capable of accommodating one hundred, and the Asylum five hundred and fifty children.

Children remain a few weeks at the House of Reception before being sent to the Asylum, and are also here returned to parents or given into the care of persons engaging to act as guardians.

The studies pursued are principally the elementary branches, besides history, music, and physical culture for the more advanced classes. In the industrial department the boys are furnished with employment daily from two to four hours, the work required being in the dormitories, kitchen, dining-room, and laundry, and to keep the school-rooms, bathing-room, yards, cellars, grounds, and the houses generally in order. They have also during the past year made the necessary clothing for the use of the institution, and made and repaired the shoes.

For current expenses \$110, for each child supported during the year, are allowed to be drawn from the city treasury, to which is also to be

added a share in the school fund, equal to about \$8 *per caput*. This being insufficient, from \$10,000 to \$20,000 are required to be raised every year by private subscriptions.

The average cost of each child per annum is \$100.

Second. Crippled children past hope of cure, and therefore no longer retained in ordinary hospitals.

Third. Children of poor parents obliged on account of sickness to enter a hospital, and who commit their children for a season to our charge, with the expectation upon recovery of reclaiming their own.

Fourth. Children rendered temporarily homeless by fire or other accident.

Fifth. Children whose home has been broken up by the intemperance or desertion of father or mother. In such cases the remaining parent pays according to ability a small sum monthly.

Sixth. Children abandoned by both parents, brought to us by friends or relatives unable to find immediately a proper home, and yet unwilling to lose control of the children or to place them beyond their reach.

Children placed at the Sheltering Arms are not surrendered to the institution, but are held subject to the order of parents and relations.

All the children of sufficient age attend the school of the institution, where they receive a common education. The larger girls are also trained to household work.

By the report of the board of trustees, May, 1871, it appears that one hundred and fifty-two children have been inmates of the house.

The first meeting of ladies for the establishment of this institution was held in the autumn of 1849, one of whom donated \$1,000 towards the object, and with this they secured accommodations on the North River in a building known as Woodside, where twelve pensioners were maintained for four years. In 1842 the society received a donation \$2,000 towards a building fund, and the next year they purchased and built on the corner of Fourth avenue and Fortieth street. In 1845 the society was incorporated and received from the Legislature an appropriation of \$10,000. An additional sum of \$12,000 was appropriated in 1866; and this is all the aid the Home has received from the State during the nearly thirty years of its existence. The present edifice was erected in 1848. The grounds comprise forty-four lots.

This institution, managed by an association of twenty-one ladies, aided by ten gentlemen as advisers, is under the general supervision of the Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction. It combines the double purpose of an almshouse and hospital. A lying-in and nursery department are also attached to the institution. The expenses of the Home are defrayed in part by an allowance from the Commissioners of fifteen cents per day for pauper inmates, and twenty-six cents per day for hospital patients, and in part by voluntary subscriptions of citizens and invested donations.

The description of the new building to be erected on the ground donated by the legislature, between Sixty-eighth and Sixty-ninth streets and Lexington and Third avenues, is as follows:

The Asylum buildings are designed by N. Le Brun, architect, and will be located upon the block bounded between Sixty-eighth and Sixty-

ninth streets and Lexington and Third avenues. In their distribution and arrangements great care has been taken to embody all the latest improvements recommended by distinguished modern authorities, which, where introduced, have been attended by the most perfect results.

In the centre of the lot on Sixty-eighth street is placed the administrative building, 90 feet wide by 60 feet deep, and five stories high, exclusive of the basement. This building will contain the chief offices, parlors for visitors, kitchen, dining rooms, pantries, workrooms, bathrooms, closets, elevator, dormitories and infirmary for the Sisters. To the north of, and connected with this building, will be the chapel, 40 feet wide and 80 feet long. In the basement under the chapel will be the playrooms for the children. On each side of the main building, and parallel therewith, will be two wards, each 30 feet wide and 90 feet long, with a pavilion at each end of the same, about 40 feet square. These wards will be three stories high, exclusive of the basement, and be placed at a sufficient distance apart from each other to allow an ample free circulation of air and a full play of the sun's rays around them, to aid which the corridors connecting them with the centre building and with each other will consist of open arched passages extending but one story in height. The heights of the several stories in the centre building and wards are as follows: Basement, 10 feet 6 inches; first story, 15 feet 6 inches; second story, 14 feet 6 inches; third, fourth and fifth stories, 14 feet high—all in the clear. In the basement story of the various wards will be offices for the physicians, the dispensaries, waiting rooms, nurses' and sewing rooms, small kitchens and storerooms. In each story of the pavilions, at front end of the wards, will be placed rooms for the accommodation of the Sisters in charge of the wards, linen storerooms, bathrooms, closets, &c. At the north of the pavilions, in each story, will be the children's bathroom, a steam drying room, a small kitchen, bathroom and closets for the nurses, &c. At the centre, on the lot of Sixty-ninth street, will be placed a two-storied building, 90 feet front, for the laundries, ironries, drying room, kitchen, pantries and storeroom. In the upper story of the same will be the accommodation and sleeping rooms for the servants of the establishment. The boilers for the generation of steam to heat and ventilate the whole establishment will be placed in a vault to be constructed under the pavement on Sixty-ninth street. In this vault will also be placed the steam engine, fan wheels, &c. The large ventilating shafts will be placed at the north end of centre of lot. The main shaft for ejecting foul air and the products of combustion will be 126 feet high; the shafts for fresh air will be 65 feet high.

The whole of the arrangements and combinations of the various

buildings are made to aid, as much as possible, the easy performance of the administrative duties between the central buildings and the pavilions. The greatest care has been taken in devising the plans to provide for a perfect system of heating and ventilation. The windows of the wards will also be peculiarly arranged for natural ventilation, whenever such method is required during the warm season. The exterior of all the buildings will be faced with Philadelphia brick, relieved by sufficient Ohio stone dressings and bands of white and black brick, so as to produce, through the most economical means, a rich and pleasing appearance to the whole. A crib for the reception of foundlings is placed in the vestibule of the Asylum building, in which infants may be left without inquiry or observation.

New York Infant Asylum.

(Protestant.)

24 CLINTON PLACE.

Chartered 1865. Reorganized 1871. Opened Nov. 27, 1871.

Designed for the reception and care of homeless infants, abandoned by parents, or accompanied by their mothers who will nourish their offspring.

The institution is under no sectarian control, but it is to be managed by a Board of Lady Managers representing all the Protestant denominations of the city, and by a like constituted board of gentlemen acting as Trustees.

It is the intention of the Managers, as soon as the necessary funds shall be secured, to establish a home in the country, where the children, under the care of the institution, shall be reared. The plan is to erect several cottages, each of which shall stand detached, and contain only a limited number of infants, and which shall be established on a farm to be purchased or leased by the association, retaining the house in New York as a house of Reception, merely.

It has been the object of the institution to extend, as much as possible, its means of usefulness by receiving, when it is practicable, the mothers of the children committed to their charge as wet nurses. By this means the pernicious system of bringing up by hand is avoided, and an opportunity afforded for reclaiming the erring mother as well saving the friendless child.

Bloomington Asylum for the Insane.

ONE HUNDRED AND SEVENTEENTH STREET, ON BLOOMINGDALE ROAD.

A department of the New York Hospital, the management of which is vested in a committee of six governors annually appointed by the board. A farm at White Plains, N. Y., consisting of about three hundred acres, has been purchased, and upon this suitable buildings will be erected as soon as practicable.

Accommodations for about one hundred and eighty persons, all of whom pay board (invariably in advance), ranging from \$12 to \$30 per week.

Before a patient can be admitted into the Asylum it is necessary that a lunacy warrant from any *one* justice of the peace or police magistrate of this city, issued upon the evidence of *two* reputable physicians as to the alleged facts of insanity, be procured. A permit from one of the Asylum committee, with whom the payment of the board must be arranged, is also required.

This is a new building erected by the Commissioners of Charities and Correction at a cost \$800,000. It consists of a central, administrative building and four wings, furnishing accommodation for about 400 patients, which number it now contains. The style of architecture is the middle pointed Gothic, and the materials used in its construction are Collaberg brick with facings of Cleveland stone. The building is heated and ventilated by steam. The interior is finished in hard woods.

New York Institution for the Deaf and Dumb.

FANWOOD, WASHINGTON HEIGHTS, BLOOMINGDALE ROAD AND ONE HUNDRED AND SIXTY-SECOND STREET.

Accessible by the Hudson River Railroad (way train) from Thirtieth street, about half a mile north from the One Hundred and Fifty-second Street Station. By Third Avenue Railroad, and Eighth Avenue Railroad to One Hundred and Twenty-fifth Street, thence by private conveyance.

Preliminary meeting October, 1816. Incorporated April 15, 1817.

The town overseers of the poor or the county supervisors have power to place deaf mute children, between the ages of six and twelve years, under the charge of this Institution, "to be maintained therein at the expense of the county from whence they came, provided that such expense shall not exceed \$230 each per year, until they attain the age of twelve years."

In the case of deaf mutes of twelve years of age and over, whose parents or natural protectors have not sufficient means to meet the expenses of board, tuition or clothing at the Institution, the Superintendent of Public Instruction at Albany, N. Y., requires a certificate from the overseer of the poor to that effect, and that the person seeking its benefits "is of good moral character, free from disease, and possesses intellectual faculties capable of instruction."

Pupils are provided for by the Institution in all respects, clothing and travelling expenses excepted, at the rate of \$300 each per annum. clothing will also be furnished by the Institution, if desired, at an additional annual charge of \$50. Payment is required semi-annually, in advance.

The regular time of admission is at the close of the vacation, which extends from the last Wednesday in June to the first Wednesday in September. No pupil will be received at any other time, except in very extraordinary cases.

No deduction will be made from the annual charge in consequence of absence, or on any account whatever except sickness, nor for the vacation.

Applicants for admission to be educated at the public expense should be between the ages of six and twenty-five years. The Institution will not hold itself bound to receive any not embraced within this rule, but may do so at discretion.

Satisfactory security will be required for the punctual payment of bills, and for the suitable clothing of the pupils.

Applications from a distance, letters of inquiry, &c., must be addressed to the principal of the Institution. The selection of pupils to be supported at the public expense is made by the Superintendent of Public Instruction at Albany, to whom all communications on the subject must be addressed.

Should objection exist to the admission of any individual, the Board reserve to themselves or their officers a discretionary power to reject the application.

Institution for the Improved Instruction of Deaf Mutes.

BROADWAY, BETWEEN FORTY-FOURTH AND FORTY-FIFTH STREETS.

Established February 28, 1867, by a number of gentlemen forming the association for the Improved Instruction of Deaf Mutes. Its objects are to teach deaf mute children (whether congenitally deaf or from disease in infancy) and semi-mutes to use articulated sounds instead of the manual alphabet or the sign language, as taught in the various State Institutions, and to enable them to read, write and to understand the written language, and to read from the lips of others.

The Institution is supported by the members of the association paying \$10 each annually, by the interest accruing from a small sinking fund, donations, and fees for tuition from such pupils as are able to contribute, and by an allowance from the State of \$230 for each pupil received on the certificate of the county supervisor or overseer of the poor. Poor children are admitted gratuitously and supplied with everything except clothing.

The school is under the superintendency of Mr. F. A. Rising, A. M.

Application for the admission of pupils must be made to the President of the Institution or to the principal at the school.

Visitors are always admitted, and will be made welcome.

infirm or indigent persons as it may receive under its care or otherwise minister to; and to establish and maintain such other institutions for charitable or reformatory uses and purposes as may be determined upon by the board of managers.

In 1857 a plot of ground was purchased. November 25th, 1858, the corner stone of the present Home for the Aged and Orphan was laid. The building was completed in 1859, and is now occupied as an orphan house.

The fronts are of Philadelphia brick, trimmed with Ohio brown stone. The estimated cost of the edifice, without interior fittings, is \$200,000. There is ample accommodation for over two thousand inmates. In the basement are several large play-rooms for the children in wet weather. The first story will contain classrooms, reception-rooms, and offices for the transaction of business. On the second floor are the dormitories, dispensing and consulting-rooms. The third and fourth floors will also be used for sleeping apartments. In the tower, cut off from all other apartments, are rooms where inmates will be removed in case of contagious disease. There is a fine Gothic chapel in the rear of the main building. It is forty feet wide, one hundred and five feet long, and sixty-six feet high from floor to ceiling. Beneath this is the dining-hall. Apart from the rest is another building, two stories high and of large dimensions, in which a boiler will be placed for heating and other purposes.

This House, as its name implies, has been established for the purpose of affording the benefits and comforts of medical aid and kind nursing to those who are suffering from pulmonary consumption, and cannot obtain the relief they so much need for themselves. It is designed to give the inmates of this charity the advantages of a home, where the disease may be made a specialty, and treated as having a hope of improvement, if not of complete restoration. As soon as possible land will be secured in White Plains, where permanent and suitable buildings will be erected. The House is under the immediate care of Miss Bogle, a lady of thoroughly tested ability and experience, who has offered her services gratuitously to this work. The only persons connected with the House who receive compensation for services are the nurses and domestics.

It is the wish of the trustees to make as many of the beds as possible free, but until the finances of the House will allow of this, they will take some pay patients at the lowest price at which they can be supported.

For \$300 a year a bed will be assigned any one subscribing this sum, and the same will be reserved for a patient chosen by the subscriber.

This House is not intended to be what too many of our charitable institutions are—a charity boarding-house—but rather a place of rest and quiet, where poor consumptives may enjoy such blessings as only an institution of this kind can afford.

The Inebriates' Home for Kings County.

FORT HAMILTON, N. Y.

Incorporated December 29, 1866. Opened October 10, 1867.

Up to the present time this institution has been conducted in a country mansion house, delightfully situated on the banks of the Narrows, but far too small to meet the pressing demands of both sexes and all classes of inebriates applying for admission. The executive committee have now erected an extensive building, fifty feet by one hundred and thirty feet, and four stories high, peculiarly adapted for the care and treatment of inebriates. One of the great obstacles to the successful treatment of this class of patients has been the unsuitability of the building, which, in most cases, was constructed for other and widely different purposes. The committee, after an experience of nearly five years, aided by their physicians and superintendent, have devoted their best energies to the planning of a model building, adapted to the treatment of both sexes, embracing complete separation and thorough classification.

This is the only institution where separate provision has been made for lady patients. All the approaches to their apartments are constructed with the special object of securing that privacy and protection which form the essential prerequisites to confidence. Their rooms occupy one entire floor of the building, besides separate dining-rooms and two separate staircases.

Gentlemen of culture and refinement of tastes and habits can here secure private apartments, where, if they wish, they can seclude themselves from all the other inmates of the Home.

Smoking and billiard-rooms are provided. The building is fitted up with the modern conveniences, and will be lighted with gas.

There are twenty-six acres of park and garden grounds. The structure stands on a bluff, overlooking Staten Island, the upper and lower bays, and the coast of New Jersey.

Steamer from foot of Twenty-sixth Street, East River, at 10½ A. M., 1½ and 3½ P. M.

This Hospital receives patients suffering from all varieties of disease, especially those of a chronic nature; about one-fifth of the entire number of cases treated are syphilitic in character. The Hospital has a capacity of 1,000 beds, and there are two pay wards, to which patients are admitted at a nominal charge of \$12 a month.

There are two surgical, three medical, two venereal, an ophthalmic and a uterine and obstetric division, and to each of these three visiting surgeons or physicians are appointed, who do duty alternately for a period of two months.

The management of the Hospital is vested in a resident medical officer, the chief of staff, who is assisted in the discharge of his medical duties by a staff of fifteen house physicians and assistants. The Hospital departments of the penitentiary, workhouse and almshouse, and the Incurable Hospital, are under the supervision of the chief of staff, and the members of the home staff perform medical service in each of them.

The visiting physicians and surgeons form a medical board, meeting on the first day of each month, and acting as an advisory body to the board of commissioners.

The Asylum has been enlarged and greatly improved in its internal arrangements of dormitories, play-rooms, and dining-rooms. The inmates have been classified, and those showing any degree of mental ability have been separated from those whose condition is hopeless. Competent teachers are employed for the education of the better class of these children, many of whom have made very marked progress in their studies. The steady increase in the number of inmates has necessitated an additional enlargement of the Asylum building. This will probably be made during the present year, an appropriation for that purpose having been obtained from the Legislature.

The new Hospital building is located on the corner of Lexington avenue and Sixty-sixth street. It will comprise a large central compartment with two extensive wings, and will be in the Tudor Gothic style. The building is rapidly progressing towards completion, and it is expected that the main building and one of its wings will be opened about June 15, 1872. The estimated cost of the building and furniture will be \$325,000.

The Roosevelt Hospital.

FIFTY-NINTH STREET, BETWEEN NINTH AND TENTH AVENUES.

*Incorporated February, 1864. Corner-stone laid October 29, 1869.
Opened for the reception of patients November 2, 1871.*

The funds for the erection and endowment of this Hospital were bequeathed for the purpose by the late James H. Roosevelt, Esq., of this city, who died in November, 1863, leaving the bulk of his property for the establishment of the above institution. By his will he devised "All the rest and residue of my personal estate, including lapsed legacies, together with all my estate not hereinbefore well and effectually disposed of, I give in trust to the several and successive presidents *ex officio* for the time being of the respective managing boards of those five certain incorporations in the city of New York known as The Society of the New York Hospital, The College of Physicians and Surgeons in the City of New York, the New York Eye Infirmary, The Demilt Dispensary, and the New York Institution for the Blind, and to my friends the Hon. James I. Roosevelt, Edwin Clark, Esq., John M. Knox, Esq., and Adrian H. Muller, Esq., all of said city, and to the survivors or survivor of them, for the establishment in the city of New York of a hospital for the reception and relief of sick and diseased persons, and for its permanent endowment."

DESCRIPTION OF THE BUILDING.

The hospital is built upon the "pavilion plan," now generally acknowledged to be the best, as affording the most sunlight and air. The entire plan comprises four such pavilions, or separate buildings, each being a hospital in itself. An open space or courtyard of ninety feet is between the pair of these buildings, at each end, and the space between those in the centre is 180 feet, which is, however, partly used by the administrative building, or that which will contain the offices and apartments of the officers, also the amphitheatre, or lecture room, some private patients' rooms and two small associate wards on the upper

floors for female patients. In the rear of the administrative is the kitchen and laundry building, containing also the bakery, engine and boiler and other rooms. At a considerable distance from the hospital buildings is a mortuary building, divided into rooms for curator, laboratory, lecture or autopsy room, dead and coffin room, pathological museum and a keeper's room. Near the mortuary building are to be erected the future stable, carpenter and other shops and carriage sheds.

One of the pavilions is entirely complete and ready for occupancy. It has a cellar, basement, and three stories above the latter. In each of the three upper stories is a ward, or dormitory, thirty feet wide by 106 feet long and fifteen feet high; each ward is to contain twenty-eight patients; each patient will, therefore, have over 1,700 cubic feet of air space. In addition to these wards are a few single rooms for particular cases, or private patients who pay liberally for accommodations. Each floor or ward has also a nurse's room, ward kitchen and scullery, convalescent dining-room, lavatory or washroom, a steam drying room for mattresses, water-closets, slop-sinks and other accessories; also steam vapor-baths. The toilet-rooms are arranged differently from the usual way; instead of placing them against the walls they are placed in the centre of the room and grouped around a shaft, which extends through all the stories, cellars and basements. This shaft answers two purposes—as the plumbers' and steam-heating pipes are placed within it, it affords facility for reaching them readily, if need be, and, secondly, the shaft acts as a ventilator by conveying off impure air. For thoroughly cleansing and disinfecting these necessary appurtenances, a modern improvement has been introduced, and perhaps it is the first instance of it. Each toilet is so contrived that steam can readily be injected into it, and in this way thoroughly steamed, cleaned and disinfected. There is also a shaft extending from the basement to the upper story, as a receptacle for the soiled linen from each story, which lessens the labor of the attendants by not requiring them to carry it up and down stairs; and as all the soiled linen is dropped into one shaft and falls to the bottom of it, into an especial place for it, the laundry maids always know where to find it. The clean linen for each story is conveyed by dumb-waiters communicating with each linen-room.

An additional labor-saving contrivance are the dust-flues, which are numerously distributed over the building, in all the rooms, halls and passages. On a level of each floor the dust and rubbish can be swept into a flue formed of glazed pipe, twelve inches in diameter, and terminating in the collar, and into an iron receptacle, whence all can be removed readily to the boiler furnace and burned. Each ward is also

furnished with outlets in several places for hot and cold water to supply a portable bath for patients who are too feeble to be taken to the bath-rooms. At each end of the building and on each story large fire-hose are provided and constantly attached, ready for use in case of fire; also in each courtyard is a fire-plug, with hose attached, so as to force water upon any part of the building, if need be. The fire-plugs are supplied with water from the tanks within the buildings; but all the hose are also connected with a powerful steam-pump and engine in the boiler house. An additional precaution against fire, and affording safety for patients, is a spacious fire-proof (stone) stairway. For patients who are too weak to ascend a stairway a steam elevator has been provided, which also affords an additional convenience for the officers and attendants. In the basement of the pavilion are offices, accident, ophthalmic and single wards, with auxiliary rooms, as on the upper floors. In all, the pavilion will accommodate about one hundred patients. Each pavilion also has apartments for one or two physicians.

The cellar is mostly used for air-ducts and heating apparatus, which is done by conveying a constant supply of fresh air over coils of steam pipe, and reaches the rooms in a heated degree sufficient to warm them. The fresh air is taken at a height of sixty feet above the surface of the ground, so as to get it pure and free of dust. A tower or shaft of this height and twelve feet in diameter, was built especially for this purpose. It is open on the top, where the fresh air descends to the cellar and to the air chambers containing the steam-coils. The ventilation is so abundantly provided for that it cannot now be described. Each gaslight even has a ventilating flue to carry away its combustion, by which the atmosphere of the room would otherwise be vitiated.

The building is provided with four different systems of ventilation. First, the natural ventilation of opposite windows and other contrivances; second, ridge ventilation, the foul air being conveyed under the ridge of the roof, and there finds escape; third, and principally, by a ventilating chimney, 130 feet high and sixteen feet in diameter, inside measure. This chimney has an inner one of iron, like a smoke-pipe of a large steamboat. This smokepipe receives the smoke of four large boilers, also all the smoke from the kitchen, bakery and laundry. The smoke and heat from the boilers is enough to heat the outer chimney, so as to attract all the foul air from the ducts and flues connected with it from all the buildings, and here escapes.

These three systems are in successful operation. The fourth system is that of a fan, which is not yet provided, but can be introduced at any time. As an additional provision for purity of atmosphere, the walls and floors have been rendered, with four coats of oil paints, so as

to present a surface which cannot absorb impurities and which can be washed with soap and water. Near the beds of the patients are also flues with doors, as a temporary receptacle of necessary articles used in a sick ward which might prove offensive. One pavilion is in course of construction which will only be one story in height. It is especially designed for surgical patients. It will have a ward 130 feet long, thirty feet wide and twenty feet high. The exterior view is very pleasing to the eye, and the architectural beauty of it was much admired. The roofs are Mansard and are surmounted by towers of artistic design.

The kitchen is a model of neatness and efficiency. It is seventy-eight feet by sixty-eight feet, and includes laundry, wash-room, ironing-rooms, drying-rooms, &c., on the main floor. It is supplied with steam power, washing and mangling machines, an immense larder, capable of holding ten tons of ice and meats. The range is fourteen feet long, and over it is a canopy to catch the odors and convey them off to the pipes. This structure, which is in the rear of the main pavilion, is so ventilated that the employés will not be subjected to extreme heat, or any inconvenience. As yet but two pavilions—those on the east side—are complete. They will accommodate about one hundred and fifty patients, who will receive every comfort, including bath-rooms, ward-ropes and closets on each floor. The main, or central pavilion, is completed exteriorly, but not interiorly.

The trustees propose to complete the other two pavilions as soon as the appropriation increases to such a sum as warrants it, as it is not intended to use any of the original endowment upon the building, but to leave it as a reserve for the maintenance of wards for patients who are unable to pay for treatment.

The management will charge a reasonable rate for treatment of such as can pay for it. They also propose to permit endowments of beds. A donation of \$5,000 will entitle the donor to nominate occupants either personally or through his heirs for all time; and \$3,000 will guarantee such privilege during the lifetime of the donor.

Presbyterian Hospital.

MADISON AVENUE, BETWEEN SEVENTIETH AND SEVENTY-FIRST STREETS.

Incorporated March 26, 1868. In process of construction.

Early in the year 1868 a movement was set on foot by Mr. James Lenox, and other wealthy and prominent gentlemen connected with the Presbyterian, the Reformed and the Reformed Presbyterian Churches in this city, for founding a Presbyterian Hospital. On the 26th day of March, 1868, a charter was considered and accepted by the board of managers; James Lenox, Esq., was elected president, and other officers were chosen. A permanent legal status having been thus secured, at a subsequent meeting Mr. Lenox conveyed in due form to the board of managers, for hospital uses, the block of ground bounded by Seventieth and Seventy-first streets, Madison and Fourth avenues, and the sum of \$100,000 in money, paying also the government tax on its transfer, for benevolent purposes, amounting to \$12,000. The site is one of the most eligible that could have been selected for the purpose. Large additional funds will be needed to carry out the designs of the founder—no less, it is estimated, than \$500,000, of which about \$150,000 have been subscribed.

The buildings will extend two hundred feet from north to south, and four hundred from east to west. The Hospital, when completed, will consist of three pavilions (accommodating about three hundred patients), an administration building and a boiler-house, all connected in the basement, first and second stories by corridors of communication—of light construction above the basement, in order to secure a free circulation

of air. All of the buildings, excepting the boiler-house, are to be three stories high, with basement, and attic in Mansard roof. The basement will be eight feet high. The first story and attic will be twelve feet high respectively; while the height of the second and third stories will be fourteen feet and six inches in the clear. The best means for heating, ventilation and lighting will be employed.

The administration building, boiler-house, and the large pavilion on Seventy-first street are completed, and will be opened for the reception of patients some time during the summer. The public opening of the Hospital is expected early in October. The institution will accommodate, in the buildings just completed, about one hundred patients. The medical and surgical appointments are made for one year.

AVENUE D, CORNER TENTH STREET.

Organized 1870. Opened January 12, 1871.

Through the liberality of a private citizen of New York, the above-named institution has recently been established, and is now open for the reception of patients. The Hospital is situated in a healthful locality, and is provided with the most modern and approved appliances for the comfort, welfare, and treatment of the sick. Its wards are spacious and well ventilated; Russian, Turkish and medicated baths are comprised among its bathing accommodations. Especial care has been exercised in the selection of faithful and capable nurses. The Hospital is intended to afford to persons of moderate means the best and most efficient aid in the treatment of medical and surgical diseases.

One half of its beds are free for the reception of such worthy persons, requiring hospital treatment, as may be unable to pay the customary charges.

Persons of ample means will not be admitted except under special circumstances, and after application has been made to the resident physician of the institution by a member of the visiting staff.

The Hospital has ample capacity for two hundred patients. It is divided into four departments, as follows:

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS.

The charge for board is \$7 per week, payable monthly in advance.

Private rooms from \$20 to \$25 per week.

For children, \$3 per week.

Cases of sudden injury occurring in the vicinity will be temporarily cared for without charge.

No cases of contagious disease will be admitted.

No incurable cases will be received. Such cases as, after thorough and satisfactory medical treatment, may be pronounced chronic, and cannot be further relieved, will not be retained for an indefinite period.

Application for admission must be made to the resident physician

personally, by the friends of patients, or (if necessary) by letter, and not by patients in person, as all applicants must be examined by the resident physician at their places of abode before admission to the Hospital.

Applications from the country must be accompanied with the certificate of a responsible physician, giving a concise history of the disease or difficulty, and condition of the applicant.

The Stranger's Hospital is designed to afford a home in sickness for permanent as well as transient residents of the city, who are unable to obtain at home or hotel the care and treatment of which they stand in need. It also admits those from the country afflicted with grave or unusual diseases, requiring for their relief a special skill and experience not readily attainable at their homes.

The accommodations for private patients are ample and commodious, and afford every desirable comfort and convenience for the sick or convalescent. For the benefit of the latter class, the patron of the Hospital has established a reading-room, furnished with fine pictures, and a chess-room; both of which, on appointed evenings, are made available to residents of the vicinity.

STATISTICS.

During the past year 264 cases have been admitted, of which 22 have died, 14 of these latter being fatal accident cases from the neighborhood.

New York State Woman's Hospital.

Hospital of the New York Society for the Relief of the Ruptured and Crippled.

FORTY-SECOND STREET, CORNER LEXINGTON AVENUE.

Incorporated April 23, 1863.

The benefits of this institution are extended gratuitously to the indigent residents of New York City and environs, as well as to all crippled soldiers who have served in the United States army; but a moderate charge is made according to the circumstances of other patients, the amount received being for the support of the establishment. These benefits consist in supplying professional services and surgico-mechanical contrivances, mainly to incipient cases of deformity, and in treating hopeful cases, whether congenital, the consequence of paralysis, or the result of scrofulous disease. Trusses are made to relieve extraordinary rupture, with reference to the special indications. Supporters for women, lace stockings, and every variety of bandage are furnished to the indigent.

Open every week-day for the treatment of out-door patients, and for the reception of applications of in-door patients, from nine to twelve A.M., and every Wednesday evening from seven to nine. Applications for in-door patients will be received every day (Sundays excepted) from

two to five P.M. Days for visiting in-door patients, Monday and Saturday from three to five P.M.

The Society purchased in August, 1867, five lots (one hundred and twenty-five by one hundred feet) on the north-west corner of Lexington avenue and Forty-second street, upon which a hospital has been constructed containing two hundred beds, and where their system of combining instruction with treatment is continued. Students admitted to clinical instruction upon application to the resident physician and surgeon.

Healthy wet nurses, upon presenting a certificate of good character, are admitted, if there be a vacancy, with the understanding that while at the institution they shall nurse a child in addition to their own, or if the latter be deceased they shall nurse and feed two children. Parties obtaining wet nurses from this institution must pay \$5 premium.

An applicant for admission into the lying-in department must present

a certificate of former good character, be perfectly clean and free from contagious disease, and come provided with sufficient clothing for her own and her child's use while in the institution. If she pay \$25 board (or in case she enters before the commencement of labor, \$5 a week in advance) she may leave as soon as is deemed prudent by the physician in attendance, herself providing for her child. If she pays no board she must remain three months after her confinement, nursing and feeding two infants, unless otherwise ordered by medical authority.

State Lunatic Asylum.

UTICA, N. Y.

Opened January 16, 1843.

On line of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad.

Controlled by a board of managers, who report to the State Legislature. Board per week, for private patients, \$6 and upward. Accommodates six hundred patients.

“The county superintendents of the poor of any county, and any overseers of the poor of any town to which any person shall be chargeable, who shall be or become a lunatic, may send such person to the Lunatic Asylum by an order under their hands.”

The order of a county judge secures the admission of indigent persons not paupers; in which order it must be stated that the applicant became insane within one year prior to the date of the order. (Sec. 26, act of 1842, and sec. 2 of chap. 282, Session Laws, 1850.)

Patients sent through this channel generally supply their own clothing, and pay their own travelling expenses to and from the Asylum.

Patients supported by their friends are received without any other paper than certificates from county or bank officers, or other prominent individuals, of the ability of those who become bound for their support in the Asylum to meet all expenses incurred.

The form of agreement entered into by the person or sureties who become bound for the patient admitted is as follows:

“Whereas, — —, of the town of — —, in the county of — —, an insane person, has been admitted as a patient into the New York State Lunatic Asylum at Utica; now, therefore, we, the undersigned, in consideration thereof, bind ourselves to Edmund A. Wetmore, treasurer of said Asylum, to pay to him and his successors in office the

sum of — dollars and — cents per week, for the care and board of said insane person so long as he shall continue in said Asylum, with such other charges as may be occasioned by his requiring more than ordinary care and attention, and also to provide him with suitable clothing, and pay for all such necessary articles of clothing as shall be procured for him by the steward of the Asylum, and to remove him from the Asylum whenever the room occupied by him shall be required for a class of patients having a preference by law, or whenever he shall be required to be removed by the managers or superintendent; and we also engage to pay all expenses incurred by the managers or superintendent in sending said patient to his friends, in case one or either of us shall fail to remove said patient when required to do so as aforesaid; and if he shall be removed at the request of his friends before the expiration of six calendar months after reception, then we engage to pay board for twenty-six weeks, unless he should be sooner cured, also to pay not exceeding fifty dollars for all damages he may do the furniture or other property of said Asylum, and for reasonable charges in case of elopement, and funeral charges in case of death; such payments for board and clothing to be made semi-annually, on the first of February and August in each year, and at the time of removal, with interest on each bill from and after the time it becomes due.

“In witness whereof we have hereunto set our names this the — day of —, in the year 187—.”

This agreement or understanding is generally signed by near relatives or other friends of the patient, or legal guardians, if any such there be, at or prior to the time of admission, or subsequently upon the deposit, on the admission of a patient, of the sum of money sufficient to secure its execution.

“When an insane person in indigent circumstances shall have been sent to the Asylum by his friends, who have paid his bills therein for six months, if the superintendent shall certify that he is a fit patient and likely to be benefited by remaining in the institution, the supervisors of the county of his residence are authorized and required, upon an application under oath in his behalf, to raise a sum of money sufficient to defray the expenses of his remaining there another year, and to pay the same to the treasurer of the Asylum. And they shall repeat the same for two succeeding years, upon like application and the production of a new certificate each year of like import from the superintendent.

“All town and county officers sending a patient to the Asylum shall, before sending him, see that he is in a state of bodily cleanliness, and is comfortably clothed and provided with suitable change of raiment, as prescribed in the by-laws.”

All patients require at least two suits of clothing and several changes of under-garments. Most of the patients go out regularly, and consequently require clothing suited to the season. For males, great-coats

and boots are required in winter; shoes answer in summer, slippers are worn in the house. Females also need ample clothing for walking or riding in the winter.

The supply should be liberal when it can be afforded. All clothing is marked with the name of the patient to whom it belongs, and much pains are taken to have it kept in good order and repair.

The removal of a patient should not be attempted while laboring under severe bodily disease, as fevers, erysipelas, large and dangerous wounds or sores, consumption, &c.

The patient should be brought by an intelligent and intimate acquaintance, who will be able to give a minute history of the case, or a written account should be transmitted. In the latter should be stated the name, age, married or single, number of children, occupation, degree of education, profession of religion, habits, nativity, residence, predisposing and exciting causes. Here give a minute history of the patient from youth up, temperament, peculiarities, disposition, &c. Also, the cause supposed to have affected the patient immediately preceding the attack; state what relatives, near or remote, are or have been insane or peculiar; also, what disease the patient has suffered from—fits, skin diseases, dyspepsia, constipation, piles, ulcers, &c. Give the date of the attack, going back to the first noticeable disturbance, no matter how slight; also, the duration of the more marked and decided symptoms, the number of attacks (if this be not the first); and, if ever before admitted, the number of admissions to this Asylum, and how complete was the recovery in the intervals between the attacks; state fully the condition of the patient at the time of the admission, whether suicidal or homicidal, whether he eats, sleeps, strikes, breaks, destroys, or is noisy, or inattentive to personal cleanliness, and whatever else may occur to the friends likely to be useful information.

It is desirable that application for admission be always made before the patient is brought to the Asylum, in reply to which any desired information will be cheerfully furnished.

Hudson River State Hospital for the Insane.

POUGHKEEPSIE, DUTCHESS CO., N. Y.

Instituted 1867. Building begun September, 1867.

Situated on the Hudson River, the Hospital may be reached either by railway or steamboat.

The want of hospital accommodation for the insane of Eastern New York having been urged on the Legislature in the session of 1866, the result was the creation of a commission to select a Hospital site on the

Hudson River. The commission, after a careful examination of various eligible sites, finally decided in favor of Poughkeepsie. A farm of 200 acres, of varied surface and remarkable for the beauty of its scenery and views, occupies the north-western corner of the town. For \$85,000 the citizens of Dutchess County secured and offered it as a free gift to the State. The doings of the commission were confirmed by the Legislature, and the Hudson River State Hospital was established; a board of managers, appointed by the Governor, went to work at once, a general plan for the Hospital was adopted, and Vaux, Withers & Co. were the architects selected to work it up. A high and rocky tract of nearly 90 acres, adjoining the farm upon the east, being deemed essential to the future needs of the Hospital, was at once secured. The site of the building is a plateau of about 25 acres, distant a half mile from the river, and 180 feet above it. Its rapid slopes and gravelly foundation promise entire exemption from malaria, and give every facility for drainage. The position of the Hospital, and its surroundings, are such as to insure the seclusion and quiet so desirable.

The plan of the Hospital represents a central structure with two wings, which fall back from the front line. Each wing has two transverse portions running from west to east, and three which are parallel with the centre, and run from north to south. The centre building extends 500 feet from the rear line, and the extreme ends of the wings are 1,400 feet apart. The chapel, kitchen, boiler-house, laundry, &c., extend from the central structure to the rear line, completely separating the two wings, so that patients of one sex cannot even look into the wards occupied by the other sex.

It was late in September, 1867, before work on this building could be begun. The transverse section of the north wing farthest from the corner was built in 1868. The next season saw its interior nearly completed, and another adjoining section, 310 feet in length, carried up and covered in. During the past summer and autumn the inside work of the second section has been nearly completed, and a third section of 175 feet has been put up. The structure as it now stands has a linear length of 715 feet. The basement wall, as seen above the surface, is of blue stone. The main walls are of brick, but the blank and wearisome monotony of a surface so extensive is relieved by the projecting and receding portions, by bands and window-sills of light sandstone, and by pointed stone window-heads of contrasted color. The Mansard roof, agreeably broken by the dormer windows, is covered with a uniformly dark slate. An indented course of brick surmounted by a light-colored drip-stone forms the cornice.

In a room near the boiler-house, and entirely open to the air, re-

volving fans are kept in rapid motion by a fifty-horse power engine. The strong current thus created passes into a vaulted subterranean tunnel 8 feet high, 8 feet wide, and 300 feet long. Rushing from this, it enters a spacious airduct, extending under the whole Hospital. In its effort to escape it rises from below into about 50 sheet-iron chambers, which open at the top into air flues leading to the several wards. In passing through these chambers, it comes in contact with coils of steam pipes, and thus goes up warm in winter, and fresh and cool during the summer.

A dock was early built on the river, and a road, with gentle grades and a good deal of trestle and truss work, was carried over the railway from the wharf to the Hospital. This road has paid for itself many times. A quarry, which furnished all the foundation stone; was opened in the ridge on the eastern side, and a road was made to it. To form the exercise yards, behind the contemplated sections, where the ground fell rapidly away, required a vast amount of excavation and carting and grading. These yards are inclosed by a high brick wall. Water pipes and drain pipes have been laid around or lead away from the building, and a sewer, a half a mile in length, has been carried to the river. A chimney has been put up near the boiler-house 112 feet high. It carries six separate flues, and, unlike most structures of its class, is *not* a deformity. On the highest part of the ground is a natural hollow; between two ridges of rock a reservoir was begun last summer. It will have filtering and storage basins, and its capacity will be ample for the requirements of the completed Hospital. Its elevation will allow the water to be raised to the highest part of the Hospital building. An eight-inch iron pipe one mile in length will reach from the river to the filtering basin, through which a duplex pumping engine will force the stream. This engine is estimated to pump 15,000 gallons an hour, and its boilers have been contracted for and are completed.

When this institution was established, it was the wish and intention of its managers to bring it as soon as possible into a condition suitable for the admission of patients. This purpose might have been fulfilled some time ago, had it been furthered by prompt and liberal State aid. A quantity of furniture was bought last fall, with the intention of opening a wing, but scarcity of money has prevented the proposed use of the building.

The Hospital is being built in sections, under the supervision of the medical superintendent, Dr. Cleveland, formerly of the Utica Asylum.

Willard Asylum for the Insane.

WILLARD, SENECA CO., N. Y.

Opened October 13, 1869.

In 1864 the Medical Society of the State of New York adopted a resolution calling the attention of the Legislature to the condition of the insane confined in the county poor-houses of the State. During the session of 1864 the Legislature passed an act (chap. 418, laws of 1864) authorizing the secretary of the Medical Society of the State of New York to arrange a series of questions designed to elicit the greatest amount of information relating to the condition and treatment of the insane in the poor-houses, condense and arrange the same, and present it to the next Legislature. The Legislature of 1865 received the report of Dr. Willard, Secretary of the Medical Society of the State of New York, authorized the previous year, and passed an act to "authorize the establishment of a State Asylum for the chronic insane, and for the better care of the insane poor." About the time of the passage of this act Dr. Willard died. Having been identified with the movement for the creation of the Asylum, the Legislature connected his name with it. Under the law creating the Asylum, the insane in the alms-houses may be transferred to the Asylum if the disease has existed longer than one year, and the chronic cases hitherto sent from the State Asylum at Utica directly to the poor-house as incurable, are now required to be sent to the Willard Asylum.

The law contemplates the removal of all the insane poor from the county receptacles, and their proper care in an asylum erected for the purpose.

The amount expended for the purchase of site, erection of buildings, furniture, barns, gas-houses, fences, roads, &c., to Oct. 1st, 1871, has been \$552,978.36. The amount expended upon additions to the Asylum not completed, to the same date, was \$54,715.62. These additions are the extension of the north wing and the erection of detached buildings for patients. During the current year the capacity of the Asylum will reach 800.

Le Conteux St. Mary's Deaf and Dumb Asylum.

BUFFALO, N. Y.

Organized and Incorporated September 26, 1853. In full operation 1862.

In charge of the Sisters of St. Joseph (R. C.)

The site for the building, comprising nearly an acre of land, was presented to the institution by the late Louis Couteux, a benevolent citizen of Buffalo. The funds for the erection of the edifice were raised by private donations, collections in churches and aid from the State. The institution is under the immediate charge of the Sisters of St. Joseph, educated with a view to the conduct and management of the school. The course of instruction is similar to that pursued in the State Institution. Children are received at the age of nine and retained seven years. If without protectors when discharged, they are secured situations in business or placed temporarily in families.

New York State Asylum for Idiots.

NEAR SYRACUSE, N. Y.

Established by act of Legislature, July 10, 1851.

This institution is both medical and educational.

Children, who are admitted between the ages of seven and sixteen years, must come supplied from home or county with the necessary clothing, and are received at first on probation of a month. The application must be accompanied with a full description of the case.

The matron is assisted by seven female teachers and above twenty attendants, who are educated to the point of being efficient in the training.

New York State Inebriate Asylum.

BINGHAMTON, BROOME COUNTY, N. Y.

Corner stone laid September, 1858. Opened 1864. Closed October 1, 1866. Reopened May 1, 1867.

"**Sec. 4.** Any justice of the Supreme Court, or the county judge of the county in which an inebriate may reside, shall have power to commit such inebriate to the New York State Inebriate Asylum upon the production and filing of an affidavit or affidavits by two respectable practising physicians and two respectable citizens, freeholders of such county, to the effect that such inebriate is lost to self control,

unable from such inebriation to attend to business, or is thereby dangerous to remain at large. But such commitment shall be only till the examination now provided by law shall have been held, and in no case for a longer period than one year."—*An act for the better regulation and discipline of the New York State Inebriate Asylum, passed March 31, 1865.*

Superintendent and Physician—Daniel G. Dodge.

No patient received for less than three months, nor in the first instance for a longer period than one year. The superintendent determines the length of time for which the patient shall be received.

Any inebriate having a permanent home within the State of New York, whose circumstances render it necessary, may be admitted to a free bed, at the discretion of the committee on management and discipline. If a free bed is applied for, the applicant or his friends must give satisfactory proof of the inability of the applicant or of his family to remunerate the institution for his support during his stay therein. And in addition to such proof the applicant must furnish the certificate of the county judge of the county where he resides, and if a resident of the City of New York, the mayor of the said city, that he is a proper person to be received into said institution as a free patient. All other persons will be charged according to the rooms, attendance and accommodation furnished them, taking into consideration their ability to pay; and in all cases payment in advance for three months will be required.

The committee on an habitual drunkard, duly appointed under the provisions of the laws of this State, can place such habitual drunkard in the Asylum, and authorize his detention under such restraint as may be necessary to prevent his escape.

 14. How long has the applicant used alcoholic drinks?
 15. How long a time was he a moderate drinker?
 16. How long a time has he been an excessive drinker?
 17. Has his drinking been constant and regular, or periodical?
 18. What is the usual time between his periodical indulgencies?
 19. Are his habits solitary or social?
 20. Is he violent, morose, or cheerful, when intoxicated?
 21. Are his habits and manners correct in other respects?
 22. Has he ever been an inmate of an institution for inebriates or insane? If so, how long did he remain?
 23. What kind of liquor has he used, and in what quantity?
 24. How frequently, and at what hours does he drink?
 25. Does he use opium or any of its preparations, and in what quantities, and for how long a time?
 26. State the largest quantity taken at a single dose.
 27. State the largest amount taken in twenty-four hours.
 28. Has he been in the habit of drinking wine or liquor at his meals?
 29. Has he been in the habit of drinking liquor immediately before his meals?
 30. Does he use tobacco, and to what extent?
 31. Does he sleep well at night?

- Upon entering the institution the patient, or some friend in his behalf, will be required to execute a bond or obligation to be signed by

himself and one responsible surety residing within the State, in the following form:

New York State Institution for the Blind.

BATAVIA, GENESEE COUNTY, N. Y.

Opened September 2, 1868.

Accessible from New York City by the Erie and Central Railways.

For the instruction and training of blind persons of suitable age and capacity, residing in any counties except New York, Kings, Queens, and Suffolk.

A board of nine trustees determine who are to be admitted and instructed. One hundred and thirty pupils are now enrolled.

The building, calculated to accommodate about one hundred and fifty pupils, is of three stories, and constructed of brick, with Lockport stone facings.

The superintendent of the institution, Dr. A. D. Lord, furnishes blank "applications" calling for the necessary particulars.

MEDICAL COLLEGES.

The four medical colleges in this city and Brooklyn, as well as those of this and adjacent States, are, by virtue of their charters, empowered to grant the degree of Doctor of Medicine. The requisites for graduation are: three years' study under the supervision of a regular practitioner of medicine, attendance upon at least two full courses of lectures, the presentation of a thesis on some subject connected with medicine or surgery, and the passing a satisfactory examination in all the branches pertaining to the healing art. The candidate must have attained the full age of twenty-one years, and must present written satisfactory evidence of his term of pupilage, age and good moral character.

The regular sessions begin early in October and continue until the following March. Spring, summer and autumn courses of lectures are given on special subjects, and clinics are held several times a week during the entire year.

The requirements for an *ad eundum* degree are: a diploma from an accredited medical school, satisfactory testimonials from regular physicians, members from some city, county or State medical society duly recognized, and a satisfactory examination in the practical branches of medicine, surgery and obstetrics. Candidates for an *ad eundum* degree are expected to matriculate, to take out the tickets for the course, and to pay the graduation fee.

The College is a commodious stone structure, conveniently and pleasantly situated, constructed with express reference to medical instruction, containing museum, chemical apparatus, etc., etc., exclusively devoted to the Medical Department of the University.

The regular term commences on the first Wednesday in November, and continues sixteen weeks. The preliminary term commences on the first Wednesday of October, and the College will be open to those who wish to pursue practical anatomy in advance of the lecture session. The demonstrator of anatomy will have the immediate charge of the dissecting-rooms during this month, and subsequently, always under the general direction of the professor of anatomy.

FEES AND REGULATIONS.

Students must matriculate when they commence their attendance at the lectures. Matriculation fee (annually), \$5.

The fees for the tickets of all the professors, inclusive of the hospital ticket, amount to \$75. This sum is to be paid into the hands of the dean, who issues the tickets of the several professors.

The dean is authorized to issue a perpetual ticket, on payment of \$125. The fee from those who have attended two full courses elsewhere, is \$35. The alumni of this College, and all who have attended two full courses at the institution, are entitled to all the tickets on payment of a matriculation fee of \$5.

Graduates of any respectable college, after three years' practice, will receive all the tickets on payment of the matriculation fee.

Practitioners of five years' standing, who have attended one course of lectures in a regular institution, will be received for \$35. The fee for the ticket of the demonstrator of anatomy is \$5, which is optional, except for one term before graduation.

The above comprise all the fees required of the medical student; no additional college expenses are necessary, except such as are incidental to dissection, and these are moderate. It is expected that arrangements with the dean, for the payment of fees, will be made at the commencement of the term.

RULES AND REQUISITES FOR GRADUATION.

The degree of Doctor in Medicine is conferred by the chancellor, in accordance with a vote of the council of the University, upon the joint recommendation of the faculty and curators. The following are

the requisites for graduation : Twenty-one years of age ; a good moral character ; satisfactory evidence of having studied three years ; attendance upon at least two full courses of lectures, the last of which must be at this institution.

The spring term commences March 7th, and ends July 9th. The winter term, which all candidates for graduation are required to attend, begins October 17th, and ends February 13th, 1873.

PREPARATORY EDUCATION.

The Legislature of Connecticut has provided, in the charter of the college, that a difference of one year in the period of study required for a degree, shall be allowed in favor of those who are graduates of colleges, over those who commence their professional studies without the advantages of a thorough course of preparatory study and mental discipline.

REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION.

The candidate must deposit with the dean, two weeks before examination, a thesis, written by himself, upon some medical subject, together with satisfactory certificates from a respectable and regular practitioner of medicine, that he is twenty-one years of age, possesses a good moral character, and has studied medicine under his direction for two years, if he is a graduate of a college, and three years if he is not. He must have attended two full courses of public lectures, at least one of which must have been in this institution.

The committee of examination consists of the faculty and an equal number of the members of the Connecticut Medical Society, appointed by the president and fellows of the same; and the president of the society is ex-officio president of the committee of examination. Two examinations for degrees are held annually—one in January, at the close of the winter term, the other in July, on the Tuesday before commencement.

New York College of Dentistry.

CORNER OF TWENTY-FIRST STREET AND BROADWAY.

The College was established for the purpose of educating men for the surgical specialty of dentistry; to this end the curriculum provides for the acquirement of the scientific and chirurgical requirements of the specialty. The fundamental medical sciences and the theory of both operative and mechanical dentistry are lectured upon during the winter session. Daily practice in the infirmary and laboratory, with operations at the chair and in the laboratory by the clinical lecturers, afford an ample field for the student to perfect himself in the chirurgical manual department.

As no amount of scientific attainments can compensate for a lack of skill in the manipulations required in the practice of dentistry, the greater part of the student's time is devoted to them. The practice of the specialty is taught throughout the year, while instruction in the scientific departments is restricted to the lecture term.

It has always been his peculiar duty to inquire into the causes of violent and sudden death, by a jury of proper persons, upon view of the dead body (*super visum corporis*.)

The ministerial office of the coroner is only as the sheriff's substitute in executing process. . . . Coroners are also, by virtue of their office, conservators of the public peace. All these duties continue to be attached to the office of coroner in the United States.—*Burrill's Law Dictionary*, vol. 1., page 381.

THE PREROGATIVES OF CORONERS.

The statutes regulating the number of coroners, their election, and their powers and duties in this State, are found in the Revised Statutes, art. —, sec. —.

The office in this country has lost most of the importance and dignity belonging to it in England, where its incumbent is one of the principal crown officers. Some of its high powers are, however, retained in the United States. The coroner here adjudicates in the gravest cases of crime, and is *the only civil officer superior to the sheriff*.

According to the old English law, in cases of persons dying or found dead, the body must not be moved nor touched before the arrival of the coroner, who shall be summoned instantly, and proceed without delay with the inquisition, which is to be held *in direct presence of the corpse till finished*.

The practice of this country is considerably simplified, since it is only required that the proceedings of the coroner and jury (six or more) shall be *super visum corporis*, and that a body, or a portion thereof, shall be produced. Without the latter condition the coroner cannot take a step towards investigating a crime. After a coroner and jury have viewed a body, the inquest may go on at once where the corpse lies, or in a more convenient location, and it may be adjourned to any suitable time.

In regard to the removal of bodies, the practice is to obtain a *written permit from the coroner*.

Unless the case is an unusual one, or the position and surroundings of the dead person tend to throw light on the manner of death, there is no objection to washing and laying out the body, and making the ordinary preliminary arrangements for burial.

The classes of cases referred to the Coroner are :

1. Deaths by criminal violence.
2. Deaths from casualties.
3. Deaths occurring suddenly in persons supposed to be healthy.
4. Deaths in which no physician had attended the deceased.
5. All suspicious or unusual deaths.
6. Deaths in prison.
7. *Ante-mortem* examinations.

The last class is held upon persons who have been dangerously wounded. Should they be in a hopeless condition, their dying declarations are included in the *ante-mortem* inquisition. It is important that physicians should be aware of the necessity of such declaration, and of what it should consist. For, to be effective and admitted as evidence in the courts, it must be made when the individual examined is *fully satisfied that he is about to die*, and that his dissolution is very near. Such declaration must be made before the coroner, in presence of a jury or other witnesses, and without the administration of an oath.

Coroners' cases may be reported directly to the office, old City Hall, or to any police station.

Physicians desirous of attending an inquest should notify the coroner or his deputy, the practice of the office being to extend every courtesy in the interest of science.

Amended law regulating Coroner's inquests in the County of New York:

SECTION 1. Hereafter, when, in the City and County of New York, any person shall die from criminal violence, or by a casualty or suddenly, when in apparent health, or when unattended by a physician, or in prison, or in any suspicious or unusual manner, the coroner shall subpoena a properly qualified physician, who shall view the body of such deceased person externally, or make an autopsy thereon, as may be required. The testimony of such physician, and that of any other witness, shall constitute an inquest.

SEC. 2. Should the coroner deem it necessary, he may call a jury to assist him in his investigation; or, should any citizen demand that a jury be called, he shall proceed as directed by part four, title seven, article one, of the Revised Statutes.

SEC. 3. It shall be the duty of any citizen, who may become aware of the death of a person who shall have died in the manner stated in section one of this act, to report such death forthwith to one of the coroners or to any police officer, and such police officer shall, without delay, notify the coroner of such death; and any person who shall wilfully neglect or refuse to report such death to the Coroner shall, upon conviction, be adjudged guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be punished by imprisonment in the county prison not exceeding one year, or by a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

SEC. 4. Any person except the coroner who shall wilfully touch, remove, or disturb the clothing or any article upon or near such body, without an order from the coroner, shall, upon conviction, be adjudged guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be punished by imprisonment in the county prison not exceeding one year, or by a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

SEC. 5. Any citizen of this State not over seventy years of age, and being at the time a resident of the county, may be summoned to serve as a juror upon a coroner's inquest; and any person who shall wilfully neglect or refuse to serve as such juror when duly summoned, shall, upon conviction, be adjudged guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be punished by imprisonment in the county prison not exceeding one year, or by a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

New York Morgue.

BELLEVUE HOSPITAL GROUNDS, NORTH SIDE TWENTY-SIXTH STREET,
EAST RIVER.

Under control of the Commissioners of Charities and Correction.

Opened June 21, 1866.

The Morgue, a receptacle for the bodies of unknown persons drowned or found dead in the streets, is open at all hours of the day and night.

A corpse, when brought in by the police, remains for seventy-two hours, or less, at the discretion of the hospital warden, after which it is taken to the dead-house. When identified, it is at once handed over

to the proper claimants. The clothes, hung upon rails to assist identification, are exhibited for thirty days; if not identified, they are washed, tied up in packages, and preserved for twelve months.

Photographs of the deceased, together with the registered number of the grave, are also preserved as an additional means of identification. Over forty per cent. are recognized by photographs.

Bodies, after identification, cannot be removed without the written consent of the coroner. No corpse can be opened except in the presence and by order of the coroner.

In the same building, and in the rooms adjoining the Morgue, are the coroners' rooms, the inquest room, the dead-house and hospital museum.

The provisions of the charter of 1870-'71 are that the Health Department shall consist of the Police Commissioners of the city of New York, the Health Officer of the port, and also four officers to be called Commissioners of Health of the City of New York, who shall be appointed by the Mayor for a term of five years, two of whom must have been practising physicians in said city for a period of five years preceding their appointment. Said four Commissioners of Health shall receive an annual salary of \$5,000 each. These several officers shall together constitute a board which shall be the head of the Health Department.

"There shall be four bureaus in this department. The chief officer of one bureau shall be called the City Sanitary Inspector, and he shall be a practising physician of at least ten years in the city of New York. There shall be another bureau to be called the Sanitary Permit Bureau. There shall be another bureau to be called the Bureau of Street Cleaning. The chief officer of another bureau shall be called the Register of Records. And in said bureau shall be recorded, without fees, every birth, marriage and death, and all inquisitions of coroners (excepting those whereby a jury find a death caused by negligence or malicious injury) which shall occur or be taken within the city of New York."

REPORTS REQUIRED BY LAW TO BE MADE TO THE
HEALTH DEPARTMENT BY PRACTISING
PHYSICIANS.

(Extracts from the Sanitary Code.)

REGISTRATION WITH THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

SEC. 5. * * * * * *And every physician in said city shall at all times cause his or her name, office and residence, and also his or her kind of practice, to be registered within the Bureau of Records of Vital Statistics, and in a manner prescribed by this board.*

REPORTS AS TO CONTAGIOUS AND INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

SEC. 122. That every physician shall report to the Bureau of Sanitary Inspection, in writing, every person having a contagious disease (and the state of his or her disease, and his or her place of dwelling or name, if known) which such physician has prescribed for or attended for the first time since having such a contagious disease, during any part of the preceding twenty-four hours; but not more than two reports shall be required in one week concerning the same person; but every attending or practising physician thereat must, at his peril, see that such report is or has been made by some attending physician.

Contagious diseases named by the Sanitary Code: Cholera, yellow fever, small-pox, diphtheria, typhus and typhoid fevers, relapsing fever, scarlatina, cerebro spinal meningitis.

MARRIAGES, BIRTHS AND DEATHS.

SEC. 149. That every clergyman, magistrate and other person who may perform a marriage ceremony, shall make and keep a registry of the marriage celebrated, and therein enter the full names of the parties married, and the residence, age and condition of each; and every physician, midwife and other person who may professionally assist or advise at any birth, shall make and keep a registry of every such birth, and therein enter the time and place, ward and street number of such birth, and the sex and color of every child born, and the names and residences of each of the parents, so far as the foregoing facts can be ascertained; and every physician and professional adviser who has attended any person at a last illness, or has been present by request at the death of any person, shall make and preserve a registry of such death, stating the cause thereof, and specifying the date, hour, place and street number of such death.

SEC. 150. That it shall be the duty of every person mentioned in the last section, or required to make or keep any such register, to present

to the Bureau of Records of Vital Statistics a copy of such register, signed by such person, or a written statement, by him signed, of all the facts in said register required to be entered, within five days after the birth or marriage, and within thirty-six hours after the death of any person to whom such registry may or should relate, which shall thereupon be placed on file in the said Bureau.

SEC. 167. It shall be the duty of each and every practising physician in the city of New York to report, in writing, to the Board of Health, the death of any of his patients who shall have died in said city of disease, within thirty six hours thereafter; when the disease is among those classed as contagious, within twenty-four hours thereafter, and to state in such report the specific name and type of such disease.

SEC. 162. That every person who omits or refuses to comply with, or who resists any of the provisions of the Sanitary Code, or any of the rules, orders, sanitary regulations or ordinances established or declared by this board, or any of the provisions of said seventy-fourth chapter of the Laws of 1866, or of chapter six hundred and eighty-six of the Laws of 1866, or of chapter nine hundred and fifty six of the Laws of 1867, in so far as the same are now in force and applicable to the city of New York, or the execution of any order or special regulation of this department, will be liable to the arrest, suit, penalty, fine and punishment in said laws provided and declared; of all of which notice must be taken.

Among contagious diseases the following have special mention: Cholera, smallpox, ship or typhus fever, typhoid, scarlet, yellow, and relapsing fevers, cerebro spinal meningitis or spotted fever, measles, diphtheria, or any other disease of a contagious or pestilential character. The object of having these diseases reported to the Bureau of Sanitary Inspection within twenty-four hours is, first, the necessity of the proper authority being made cognizant of any disease which may endanger the public health, in order to adopt promptly such measures as are requisite for its protection; secondly, to afford such statistics as can be made available for science generally. Blank forms for contagious diseases, specifying all the points upon which information is required, can be obtained at the office of the City Sanitary Inspector, and blank certificates of birth, death and still-birth can be obtained at the office of the Register of Vital Statistics. Births must be reported within ten days thereafter; deaths of contagious diseases within twenty-four hours, and other deaths within thirty-six hours thereafter,* and the physician is held personally responsible for the de-

* Physicians, upon placing the certificate of death in the hands of undertakers or others for transmission to the Board, should endorse upon it the time of day and the date when it was filled out.

livery of either of these certificates, within the time specified, to the proper Bureau of the Health Department at 301 Mott street, New York city.

The laws of the United States on quarantine make those of each State supreme; and United States vessels, in common with all others, are obliged to submit. In New York, quarantine was first established at Bedloe's Island in 1738. It was removed to Staten Island in 1821, and there continued until 1858-9.

Previous to the year 1847 the Marine or Quarantine Hospital was supported by a general State tax on all passengers arriving at the port of New York. In that year, the whole government and property of the quarantine establishment were transferred to the Commissioners of Emigration, a State organization rendered necessary, and at that time first constituted, for the protection of emigrants. It was made the duty of the said commissioners not only to provide for those actually sick, but for the care of persons arriving in infected vessels, who, though not manifesting symptoms of disease on arrival, were temporarily detained for the protection of the public health. The continuous arrival of emigrant vessels infected with small-pox, and repeatedly with cholera, and the annual recurrence of yellow fever, crowded the quarantine hospitals to the utmost capacity. Meanwhile the great and rapid increase of population in the vicinity of the quarantine station, and indeed throughout Staten Island and along the shore of Long Island, opposite the quarantine anchorage, and the occasional occurrence of the diseases of quarantine in the midst of this population, demonstrated the necessity of its removal in 1857. Commissioners of quarantine were appointed to effect this object. But the difficulty of obtaining a satisfactory site, the delay incident

thereto, and the recurrence again of yellow fever in the vicinity of the hospital, finally exasperated the people of the neighborhood to such a degree that on the night of September 1, 1858, a mob, estimated at a thousand strong, forced the removal of the sick and destroyed the buildings by fire. From that time until 1863 the quarantine of New York was extemporized, and to a certain extent experimental. In 1859 the hulk Falcon was transformed into a floating hospital. She proved efficient for ordinary seasons, but the experiences of quarantine at this port placed no reliance upon her to meet the exigencies at all times liable to occur. And it may be here remarked, that a quarantine that is incapable of meeting emergencies is wanting in its chief feature. In 1863 was passed the organic law on quarantine which at present obtains. Under it the quarantine establishment of New York, as at present constituted and in process of completion, comprehends warehouses, wet docks and wharves, anchorage for vessels, floating hospital (West Bank Hospital has been substituted), boarding station, burying-ground, and residence for officers and men. The same act directs the governor to appoint three commissioners of quarantine triennially from the metropolitan district as custodians of the establishment, and a health officer biennially, to have the general superintendence and control of the establishment, and the care and treatment of the sick, and to carry out all the provisions of the act.

The only quarantinable diseases are yellow fever, cholera, typhus, and small-pox, and any new diseases "not now known, of a contagious, infectious, or pestilential nature, at the discretion of the quarantine commissioners and health officer."

Persons with insufficient evidence of efficient vaccination, and known to have been recently exposed to smallpox, are required to be vaccinated and detained until the vaccinia takes effect. No other well persons shall be detained in Quarantine any longer than necessary to secure cleanliness.

This law contemplated from the first the locality which has since been defined and elaborated by several amendments, and finally made mandatory in 1866, for locating the chief structures of the establishment on West Bank, in the Lower Bay, sufficiently distant from populous neighborhoods to be free from all cause of complaint. Hospitals have there been erected equal to the accommodation of one hundred and fifty patients, with the most approved appliances. A foundation is now ready for the erection of buildings for the temporary detention of well persons, as long as may be necessary to secure cleanliness.

The Falcon having been worn out in the service, the Illinois has been fitted up to take her place as a floating boarding station, and to meet emergencies.

Much is yet required to complete the establishment, but even in its

present state it is probably the most efficacious and least objectionable quarantine establishment in the world.

The following is an abstract from the last official report of the Health officer:

CONTAGIOUS AND INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

During the year ending December 31st, 1871, 237 vessels arriving at this port have been quarantined for sickness which had occurred on board. Upon these vessels at their port of departure, on the passage and after their arrival at quarantine, there were, as far as could be ascertained, 760 cases of infectious and contagious disease, and 119 deaths. Four hundred and ten patients were also sent from these vessels to the different hospitals on Ward's and Blackwell's Islands, and West Bank.

SHIP-FEVER.

Thirteen vessels have arrived at this port during the past year, having had cases of ship-fever on board. On these vessels the number of persons exposed to the disease was 8,937, and sixteen patients were sent to the fever hospital on Ward's Island.

SMALL-POX.

During the past year small-pox has prevailed in an epidemic form throughout Europe, as well as at many of the ports in the West Indies and South America with which we are in constant communication. The following comparative statement will show the number of vessels detained at this quarantine for small-pox during the past six years, the number of patients on board of these vessels, and the total number of persons exposed to the disease:

From the above table it will be seen that the number of vessels quarantined for small-pox during the past twelve months has exceeded the total number of vessels detained for that disease during the previous five years. The number of persons exposed to small-pox on board of these vessels was 82,050, of whom 74,000 were vaccinated in quarantine. The remainder had either had the disease before or showed sufficient evidence of a recent vaccination. The number of persons attacked with small-pox on board of these vessels was, as far as could be ascertained, 365, of whom 314 were sent to hospital from quarantine.

YELLOW FEVER.

Yellow fever, during the past year, has been prevalent, to an unusual extent, at many South American and West Indian ports, and in several instances has made its appearance in an epidemic form in localities which have hitherto escaped its ravages.

During the quarantine season, from the first day of April to the first day of November, 466 vessels which arrived from eighteen ports infected with yellow fever were detained in the lower bay. During the same period, 542 vessels from doubtful and suspected ports in the West Indies and South America were detained for a brief period at lower quarantine for examination and observation. Seventy of these vessels were found to have had cases of yellow fever on board, and from these, eighteen patients were sent to West Bank Hospital. Besides these, two hundred and five cases and fifty-one deaths from this disease occurred on board of these vessels, either at their port of departure or during the passage.

CHOLERA.

For more than a year Asiatic cholera has been prevalent in different parts of Russia, and, at the beginning of the past summer, extended to the Baltic provinces and seaport of North Germany.

At this port, although several vessels arriving from infected districts reported deaths from cholera during the passage, only one, the steamship Franklin, from Stettin, had the disease on board at the time of arrival. This vessel sailed from Stettin on October 10th, touching at Copenhagen on October 12th, and Christiansand on the 15th. On leaving the latter port she had 633 passengers, and a crew of seventy-eight officers and men. The first case of cholera occurred October 23d, ten days after leaving Stettin, and from that date the disease continued to increase in virulence, until the arrival of the Franklin at this port. She was obliged to put into Halifax, November 5th, for a supply of coals, and remained there until the 8th, at which time there had been 100 cases and forty deaths from cholera. Another death occurred after leaving Halifax, and on arrival at this quarantine there were seventeen persons sick in the hospital of the Franklin with Asiatic cholera, and a large number of others were suffering from choleraic diarrhoea. The well passengers, with part of the crew, were at once transferred to the receiving ship Delaware, and the sick removed to West Bank Hospital. After the removal of the passengers from the Franklin, she was immediately cleansed and disinfected in every part, and it is gratifying to add, that although her crew remained on board, not a single case of cholera afterward occurred among them. Every precaution was also taken to ventilate and disinfect the clothing and baggage of the passengers on board the Delaware, and cases of sickness which occurred were promptly removed to West Bank Hospital. In all, seventy-two patients were received at this institution from the passengers and crew of the Franklin, and of these fifty-two presented well marked symptoms of Asiatic cholera. Of the whole number admitted to hospital nine died of cholera, and three from other diseases.

After a detention of twenty days the disease was completely eradicated, and the vessel and passengers were permitted to proceed. The precautions taken to prevent the spread of infection were also equally successful, and not a single case of cholera occurred either in the city or at quarantine from this ill-fated vessel.

Their duties are "to protect emigrants from fraud and imposition, and to take care of and maintain such emigrants as become ill or necessitous within five years after their arrival here." Among its powers is that "of sending persons on board arriving vessels for the purpose of giving advice to emigrants, and obtaining information as to their general condition, and carrying out the provisions of the several acts forbidding communication with the emigrants before landing."

They collect the *per caput* tax imposed by the State Legislature upon each emigrant arriving at the port of New York, as a protection for the different counties, and to indemnify them for the maintenance of any such emigrants who may become a charge.

STATISTICS.

The total number of passengers landed at this port during the year 1871 amounted to 271,067, of whom 41,428 were citizens or persons not subject to bonds or commutation, while 229,639 were aliens, for whom commutation was paid or bonds were executed. Of the total number of emigrants arriving during 1871, 88,601 were from Germany, 65,506 from Ireland, 36,965 from England, and 38,567 from other countries.

Total number of emigrants relieved and assisted through Castle Garden Department during 1871, 54,228. Total number of emigrants cared for and treated in Hospitals and Refuge during 1871, 14,369.

MODE OF OBTAINING MEDICAL TREATMENT OR RELIEF.

All persons sick or destitute, requiring medical treatment, or relief, who have landed at New York from a foreign port, are entitled, unless they have been in this country five years, to admission into the institution specially appropriated for the purpose at Ward's Island. Patients are sent from Castle Garden by means of a steamboat in the employ of

the Commissioners of Emigration daily at one o'clock to the Ward's Island Hospital. They are previously examined by the superintending physician, who notes, with regard to each, the name, age, nativity, vessel in which such person arrived, date of landing, and disease. They generally make application from nine A.M. until one P.M. Should they apply after one o'clock they are kept in the hospital at Castle Garden until the next day. The hospital has one ward for females and another for males. Urgent cases—such as women in the last stage of pregnancy or during parturition—are attended at Castle Garden. No patients are removed from the Castle Garden hospital unless in a condition to be safely transferred.

In addition to the sick, great numbers of indigent emigrants are conveyed to the Emigrant's Refuge upon Ward's Island.

All alien passengers are landed at the dock at Castle Garden. These are examined by the assistant physician, to ascertain whether any persons laboring under contagious diseases have escaped the health officer, and whether there are any bondable cases requiring special bonds, which are unable, either from decrepitude or disability, to earn their living, and are, in consequence, liable to become a charge upon the Commissioners for a time within five years from the date of landing.

Emigrants are frequently received into the Castle Garden building at a late hour at night. There is a porter at the gate at all hours. A physician is summoned to attend any case requiring medical treatment.

The superintendent of out-door poor is the chief executive officer of the department. All applications for relief, for admittance to the hospitals, almshouses and nurseries are made through him, as well as all voluntary committals to the workhouse.*

MODE OF ADMITTING PATIENTS INTO THE PUBLIC HOSPITALS.

Invalid applicants, unless in charge of the police, must be provided with a permit, good for five days only, signed by the superintendent of the out-door poor, giving name, nativity, age, occupation and residence in city. The statements of the applicant must be confirmed by an affidavit sworn to before a notary public, setting forth the truth of his answers, to the effect that he is without money, and has no friends or relatives who are able to provide for him. This permit is delivered to the warden, who is empowered to refuse admission to any person previously discharged for violating the rules of the house, whenever it may happen that the Commissioners have not been informed of the fact. The diagnosis of the disease is made by the examining physician at Bellevue, and the patient assigned to his proper hospital.

Any applicant, if not referrible to the care of the Commissioners of Emigration, is entitled to admission into the appropriate institution.

A steamboat provided by the Commissioners leaves daily (Sundays excepted), foot of Twenty-sixth street, East River, for Hart's Island at 10½ A.M.; for Blackwell's Island at 10½ A.M., 1½ and 3½ P.M.; for Randall's Island at 10½ A.M., 1½ and 3½ P.M.

A rowboat provided by the Commissioners crosses frequently to Blackwell's Island from foot of Sixty-first street, another from foot of Seventy-ninth street, and another to Randall's Island from foot of One Hundred and Twenty-second street.

Every case of small-pox transferable to hospital is forwarded by special conveyance to the small-pox hospital, Blackwell's Island.

OUT-DOOR POOR—HOW RELIEVED.

The city is divided into eleven districts, to each of which is assigned a visitor of the poor. The visitor reports in writing to the superintendent the name, age, color and profession of the applicant living in his district, whether married or single, number of family, sex and age of each, place of birth, how long resident in the city, cause of the destitution, and the kind and measure of relief required. The superintendent then determines the amount of relief.

* To the workhouse, which was established April 11, 1849, are committed drunkards, vagrants and disorderly persons. The terms of imprisonment are from ten days to six months.

SICK POOR.

To provide additional facilities for rendering medical aid to the sick poor the city is divided into eleven medical districts, and a physician assigned to each. It is the duty of the physician to visit and prescribe for the sick poor of his district, and to report to the superintendent of out-door poor such as may require fuel, nutritious food and other necessaries. If the sick be dangerously ill, the attending physician may call in the consulting staff of the department.

AMBULANCES.

The commissioners provide ambulances, fitted up for the easy transportation of patients, and furnished with surgical instruments, bandages, restoratives, &c. Two surgeons at Bellevue and each of the two reception hospitals have been specially assigned to the ambulance service, who are on duty alternately day and night. The surgeons and attachés of the ambulance bureau having so often experienced inconvenience from crowds of persons at the places where their services have been required, that it has been found desirable to adopt a uniform dress, in order that all the officers of the bureau shall at once be recognized upon appearing in the locality to which their duty summons them.

The drivers of the ambulances wear a sack coat of dark gray cloth, with black velvet collar and cuffs; a cap of dark gray cloth, with black velvet band, with gilt shield in centre, marked "Ambulance Bureau," and numbered. The surgeons wear a blue undress coat, with brass buttons; blue military cap, with gold cord, having in centre a wreath surrounding the words, "Ambulance Surgeon." The pants are also to be uniformly the same, but are regulated by the surgeons themselves, according to the season of the year.

Under the rules established by the board of police, a stretcher is deposited at each police station. When a casualty occurs it is made by the board of police the duty of the patrolman on the beat where the patient lies to go immediately to the station, report the case to the officer in command, and obtain assistance to convey the patient on the stretcher to the station-house. A telegram is sent to Bellevue Hospital, on the receipt of which the surgeon on duty proceeds with the ambulance to the station, and after administering such remedies as the case may require, conveys the patient to the hospital or to his home. The number of ambulance calls from January 1, 1871, to January 1, 1872, were 1,433.

The yearly expenditure is limited by an act of the Legislature not to exceed five hundred and fifty thousand dollars, appropriated by the board of supervisors upon an estimate from the commissioners.

The statute confers upon the commissioners full power to inquire into the financial condition of the institutions under their care; to examine into their methods of instruction, the management of their inmates, the conduct of trustees and officers, the condition of buildings, grounds, and all other matters pertaining to their usefulness and good management. The condition of the various alms-houses is subject to the examination of the commissioners, and some one of their number is required to visit them as often as once every alternate year.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of said board to examine, on application, all persons now employed or hereafter to be employed in putting up prescriptions or dispensing medicine in the city of New York, and give a certificate of such examination to the person so examined, if found competent to act in such capacity, and which certificate shall be deemed as a license for such person to engage in such employment.

SEC. 5. Said board shall, with the approval of the Mayor, fix the sum to be paid for such certificates by the persons to whom they shall be issued, and all sums or fees for certificates raised by said board shall be appropriated to the payment of the expenses and salaries of the members of said board, or so much thereof as may be necessary; the balance, if any, to be paid into the city treasury. Said board shall cause a true and accurate account of its receipts and disbursements to be kept, and shall once in three months make a return of the amount received and expended to the Comptroller of the city of New York.

SEC. 6. The Board of Supervisors of the city and county of New York are hereby directed to fix the compensation which each member of said board and the secretary thereof shall receive, as they may deem reasonable for the services rendered by them, not to exceed the sum of \$2,500 per annum for each commissioner and for the secretary. Said Board of Supervisors shall also raise annually by tax on the estates real and personal in the city of New York, such sum of money as may be necessary to pay any balance for expenses and salaries of said examining board which shall exist after the application, as above provided, of the sum or sums of money received for the certificates issued by said first-mentioned board.—*Chap. 202, Laws 1871.*

United States Marine Hospital Service.

Created under an Act of Congress Approved June 20, 1870.

The act authorizes the Collectors of Customs at the ports of the United States to collect from the masters or owners of each vessel of the United States, arriving from a foreign port, or registered vessels employed in the coasting trade, the sum of forty cents per month for each and every seaman who shall have been employed on said vessel

since she was last entered at any port of the United States, which sum the master or owner is authorized to collect and retain from the wages of said employés.

The fund thus obtained to be employed under the direction of the Secretary of the Treasury, for the care and relief of sick and disabled seamen employed in registered, enrolled, and licensed vessels of the United States.

The medical and surgical department is under the charge of a supervising surgeon, who is appointed by the Secretary of the Treasury to act under his direction as supervising surgeon of the Marine Hospital Service.

A seaman, to be entitled to relief from the marine hospital fund, must have served on a registered or licensed vessel of the United States for at least three months just previous to his application for aid, and must have paid hospital dues for that period.

To obtain relief, a sick or disabled seaman must apply to a collector or surveyor of customs, and furnish satisfactory evidence that he is entitled to such relief.

MEDICAL SOCIETY OF THE STATE OF NEW YORK.

*Established by an act of the Legislature, April 4, 1806, and
organized February 3, 1807.*

THE PREROGATIVES OF MEDICAL SOCIETIES IN THE STATE OF NEW YORK.

STATUTES RELATIVE TO THE INCORPORATION OF MEDICAL SOCIETIES.—The various statutes (which are somewhat numerous) authorizing the formation of medical societies, and defining their authority and powers, will be found collected in 2 *Rev. Stat.*, 5 ed., 53, 67, 616, 652.

Refusing Admission.—Power of a medical society to refuse to admit an applicant on the ground of unfitness, unprofessional practice, &c.—1 *Hill*, 665.

Initiation Fee.—A county medical society has authority, under the power to pass by-laws relative to the admission of members, to demand an initiation fee as a condition of admittance.—*Supreme Court*, 1830, *People vs. Medical Society of New York*, 3 *Wendell*, 426.

Power of Expulsion.—The power of 1 *Rev. Stat.*, 452, giving county medical societies the right to try members for ignorance, misconduct or immorality, and expel them therefor, is not unconstitutional.—*Supreme Court*, 1833, *Matter of Smith*, 10 *Wendell*, 449.

A medical society is not precluded from preferring charges against a physician by the fact of having once before refused to prefer the same charges. In such proceedings the society are but accusers, like a grand jury, and may receive additional testimony or reconsider the case, and change their determination upon the original evidence.—*Ibid.*

By-Laws.—A medical society established a tariff of fees for medical services to be performed by its members, and fixed a minimum salary to be received by any member who should be appointed to any public office in a professional capacity, and adopted a resolution declaring it should be dishonorable for any member of the society to accept any appointment or perform any service contained in such tariff of prices at a less sum than was therein specified. Subsequently, in pursuance of a by-law to that effect, a member was expelled for a violation of this regulation. Held that the regulation was void, as being unreasonable and against public policy, and contrary to law: and that the expulsion of the member was unauthorized and illegal.—*Supreme Court*, 1857, *People vs. Medical Society of Erie*, 24 *Barbour*, 570.

Geneva College not entitled to send a delegate to the State Medical Society.—*People vs. Medical Society of New York*, 18 *Wendell*, 539.

AN ACT TO REGULATE THE COUNTY MEDICAL SOCIETIES OF THE STATE OF NEW YORK. Passed April 7, 1806.

SECTION 1. That from and after the passage of this act it shall be lawful for any county medical society in this State, entitled to representation in any medical society in the State of New York and the Homœopathic Medical Society of the State of New York, to establish such rules and regulations for the government of its members as they may deem fit: provided the action of such societies receive the sanction of the State medical societies representing such county medical society, and is not inconsistent with the laws of the State.

Sec. 2. Each county medical society shall have full power and authority to enforce discipline among its members and obedience to its rules and regulations, with power to expel or otherwise discipline as they may deem most advisable for the best interests of said society. Any member of any county medical society, or applicant for membership to such society, feeling aggrieved at the action of said society, shall have the right to appeal to the medical society of the State of New York representing such county medical society.—*Laws of 1866, Vol. 1, p. 994.*

Composed of delegates and permanent and honorary members. Each county medical society in good standing is entitled to as many delegates as its county has assemblymen, each regular incorporated medical college in the State to one delegate, and the New York Academy of Medicine to five delegates. Sixteen permanent members are annually elected from those whose term as delegates has expired, and vacancies are filled only for unexpired terms. Delegates, unless permanent members, serve four years. Each State senatorial district, as fixed by the political representation of 1836, is entitled to two permanent members.

"Resolved, That the secretary publish a list of the officers and resident members of this Society, with section 3 of Article VII. of the by-laws, in a form convenient for reference:

"ART. VII. § 3. No member of this Society shall conceal his art of curing diseases, or pretend to any nostrum, or superior knowledge or skill in the treatment of diseases generally; nor shall any member professionally consult or attend patients with any known quack, or any person professing the healing art who is not regularly authorized by the laws of the State to practise physic or surgery, or both; or with any physician who does not attach himself to the Medical Society after residing in the county one year. And if any member, after a fair examination, shall be found to have been guilty of a violation of either clause of this section, he shall be fined \$5; and upon a second conviction of a similar violation he shall be fined \$10; and upon a third conviction he shall be placed upon trial for expulsion."

The officers of the Society, together with the five censors, constitute the Comitia Minora, who meet on the Wednesday preceding each anniversary and the stated meetings of the Society.

A good moral character, conformity to the codes of ethics adopted by the American Medical Association and the Medical Society of the State of New York, residence in the county without reference to date of admission into the profession, and a diploma or license approved by the Comitia Minora after personal inspection, are the prerequisites of membership.

The Society is represented in the State Medical Society by twenty-one delegates. Nominations for officers at stated meeting in September.

Annual meeting the fourth Monday in October of every year, at which time the election of officers is held.

Stated meetings are held at the College of Physicians and Surgeons, at eight o'clock, on the fourth Monday evening of every month except July and August.

OBITUARIES.

"Nihil de mortuis nisi"—*verum.*

BIGELOW, JAMES, son of Richard, late of Brooklyn, was born in Hartford, Conn., Feb. 25, 1839. He died in Brooklyn at his late residence, 129 South Oxford street, October 4, 1871. He received a liberal education within the walls of William's College, whence he graduated in 1862. Coming to New York city to study medicine, he entered the office of Prof. Timothy Childs. He graduated in medicine from Bellevue Hospital Medical College in 1866. Dr. Bigelow was always an earnest student, and he spared no pains or expense to fit himself for the profession of his choice. The first two years of his practice was spent in New York city, after which he removed to Brooklyn, where he resided during the remainder of his brief, but useful professional career. He became a member of the local Medical Society in the spring of 1868, and always manifested a lively interest in the progress of the profession, so far as his constantly increasing indisposition, from gout and renal disease, permitted. His gentility of character was at once recognized by all who met him, but he was the possessor of other traits, which were destined, had he lived, to make him an influential and helpful member of society. He was early compelled to abandon all professional labor, and to see his vital energies sapped by the progress of a malady, Bright's disease, the termination of which he knew must be fatal. But he maintained a manly, cheerful bearing to the end, being sustained by the consciousness of something better after this "life's fitful fever."

Thus has fallen from the ranks of the profession, at the early age of thirty-two years, one who will be remembered by his clients as a kindly and skilful physician, and by a large circle of friends as a conscientious, Christian gentleman, but his loss falls heaviest upon his young wife and infant child.

BOORAFM, AUGUSTUS C., was born in New Jersey, in 1826. He graduated at the Medical Department of the University of the City of New York in 1846. He died in this city, December 2d, 1871, aged 46 years.

BULKLEY, HENRY D. was born April 4, 1804 at New Haven, Conn. On the maternal side he was a descendant of John Prescott, who came to Watertown and Boston in 1640. His mother was a niece of Mrs. Roger Sherman, of Conn., whose husband was the famous signer of the Declaration of Independence. After the usual preliminary rudimentary education, he entered Yale College, and graduated there in 1821. He entered upon the study of medicine in the Medical School attached to that University, under the preceptorship of Dr. Jonathan Knight, and in the year 1830 received the degree of M. D. He came to New York in the year 1825, and engaged in mercantile pursuits here for eight years previously to entering on the study of medicine. He returned to it in 1833, and remained in it, in

extensive practice, until his decease. In 1834 he was a physician to the New York Dispensary in Centre street, in the class of Skin Diseases, and was already renowned as an expert and high authority in these diseases, both as to diagnosis and treatment. This was his favorite department of practice; he never, however, allowed his specialty to be tainted with the slightest suspicion of charlatany. In the Dispensary he gave clinical lectures and demonstrations, and contributed much towards diffusing a knowledge among the members of the profession, of these complex and troublesome ailments.

He was also connected, a little later, with the movement originated in the College of Physicians and Surgeons, of a course of Spring Lectures, and continued for some years to lecture to gratified audiences on his favorite theme; and he was further concerned in two other private institutions for the gratuitous treatment of the poor afflicted with cutaneous disorders. Later still, in 1848, his well-recognized zeal and devotion to, and eminence in his profession, procured him the appointment of Attending Physician to the New York Hospital, in which he continued until the discontinuation and destruction of the Institution in Broadway, faithfully to perform the duties of his position, and expound his doctrines on his favorite subject, and the cases under his care. In 1867 he was elected President of the Medical Society of the County of New York. In 1869 he was successful in obtaining the Presidency of the New York Academy of Medicine, an honor which he greatly coveted and enjoyed. He had been an early member and warm friend of the Institution, and during the term of his office displayed unwonted zeal in contributing to its success; always succeeding, by dint of appeal and persuasion, in filling the rostrum with able and instructive essayists; and presiding at the meetings with admirable talent and urbanity. He occupied also, at intervals, the Presidential Chairs of the Widows and Orphans' Society, the Medical and Surgical; and Dermatological Societies. His literary achievements were not great. He edited Cazenave and Schedel on Diseases of the Skin; and was for some time editor of the *N. Y. Medical Times*.

In the month of June succeeding to his laying down his functions, finding his health impaired, he made a short but very enjoyable trip to Europe, whence he returned in improved health, good spirits, and was contemplating a return to active business engagements, with prospects of a long duration of usefulness, when suddenly stricken down by the fell destroyer, who so unscrupulously thwarts the purposes of men, under the fiat of that Divinity which "shapes our ends, rough bew them as we may."

He had suffered from a cold during the week, but visited a patient on the Saturday night preceding the Monday on which the pneumonia declared itself, involving both lungs; which, despite the most vigorous efforts of his able medical friends and attendants, Drs. Wm. H. Draper, Austin Flint, Sr., and Alonzo Clark, ran rapidly to a fatal termination, Jan. 4, 1872. He retained his consciousness till about six hours previous to his death, and sank from exhaustion.

Dr. B. married, in 1835, Miss Julia Barnes, of Oneida Co., N. Y., who survives him, and by whom he had six children, four of whom are living, two daughters and two sons; one of whom has followed the profession of his father.

From the simple, but feeling and forcible eulogium pronounced from the pulpit by his pastor, the Rev. Dr. Crosby, we learn that Dr. Bulkeley "soon after settling in New York he united himself with the Presbyterian Church, and at the time of his death was in full communion and membership with the Sixth Presbyterian Church, in Fourth Avenue. From his pastor we also learned, that from the commencement of his illness he apprehended its fatal termination. He had closed his worldly accounts for the year, and set his house in order: and it is fair to believe that he departed willingly, and in peace with God, and fellowship and good-will with all mankind. Dr. Crosby spoke of his generous sympathy with all; of his kindness to the sick, and of his moral and social excellence. Among the profession he was known as an erudite, skillful physician, upright and honorable in his dealings, and an honor to his calling. He had, that we know of, no enemies; and we know that he had many friends. His pastor observes that the memories of good

men are the legacies of the Church; those of good physicians are the legacies of Medicine. We can emulate his virtues and examples. Others will come in to fill his place, and the world will keep on moving. But we may rest assured that among his contemporaries, and for at least a generation to come, his name will be remembered with affectionate reverence, and his memory kept green." His complexion was pale; he was of medium size and stature; grave, but not opposed to innocent jocularity; of pleasing manners, and it may further be said of him, that his modesty was equal to his merit.

CONNOLLY, J. J. was born in Canada, and graduated in Medicine at the Medical Department of the University of the City of New York, in 1861; after graduating he was resident physician at St. Vincent's Hospital. He died June 18, 1871.

COVERT, JOHN M., born at St. Augustine, Florida, July 25, 1832, died at 297 9th street, Brooklyn, February 18, 1872. He graduated in medicine from the Medical College of South Carolina in 1855, and in the same year located in Portsmouth, Va., and practiced with success during the prevalence of yellow fever. About two years later he went to Galveston, Texas, where he spent two years, during which period yellow fever prevailed there also as an epidemic. He afterwards returned to Virginia: During the war of the rebellion he entered the Confederate medical arm of the service, and attained the rank of colonel. In 1870 he came to Brooklyn, and engaged in general practice until his decease, which ensued upon an attack of pneumonia. He was elected a member of the county society shortly before his death. His literary attainments were varied, and his contributions, in prose and verse, to the press and to literary societies, were numerous. His wife, *nee* Augusta Patterson, of Virginia, survives him. His remains were interred in Greenwood cemetery.

CROOK, LURAD HEATH, died April 10, 1869, at his residence, Sands street, Brooklyn. His name, and the manner of his demise, demands recognition, even if it be both tardy and inadequate. Born in New York, on the 13th January, 1839, most of his life was spent in Brooklyn. He was graduated from Williams' College in 1861, and received his degree in medicine from Bellevue Hospital Medical College, in 1864. He then entered the Navy, and served as assistant surgeon until the close of the war, when he returned to Brooklyn and began the practice of his profession. He united with the County society in 1868. He was a thorough student, and, while modest and retiring in manner, was prompt and assiduous in professional duty. It was during his attendance, unremitting and without prospect of pecuniary reward, upon the mate of the pest-ship, "James Foster, Jr.," that he encountered the disease which was to close his useful life, and bring mourning to his devoted family. He was seized with typhus fever, and after a short and severe illness, died in his 31st year, and may be counted among those who have fallen as martyrs in the path of professional duty, for the relief of suffering humanity.

DALTON, EDWARD BARRY, son of John C. Dalton, M. D., was born September 21, 1831, at Lowell, Mass. He graduated from Harvard University, in 1855, and commenced the study of medicine, matriculating at the College of Physicians and Surgeons Medical Department, of Columbia College, N. Y., and received the degree of Doctor of Medicine from that institution, in 1858. After graduating, he

served for eighteen months as one of the internes at Bellevue Hospital, and was resident Physician and Surgeon at St. Luke's Hospital, N. Y., for about a year and a half. He entered the service of the United States, in April, 1861, serving five months in the navy; he was then appointed Surgeon of the 36th regiment, U. S. Volunteers. In 1863, he was appointed Surgeon U. S. Volunteers, after which he served as Medical Inspector of the 6th Army Corps, under General Sedgwick; was Surgeon, in charge of the U. S. Army General Hospital, Portsmouth, Va.; Medical Director 9th Army Corps; Medical Inspector Army of the Potomac; Lieut. Colonel; Chief Medical Officer Depot Field Hospitals, Army of the Potomac, and Brevet-Colonel. Dr. Dalton resigned from the service May, 1865, and commenced the practice of his profession in this city. In March, 1866, he received the appointment of Sanitary Superintendent to the Metropolitan Board of Health, New York City, and much of the efficient working of that Board, was due to Dr. Dalton's great executive ability. On the 12th of January, 1869, he resigned his official position, and devoted himself entirely to private practice. His health, never the most robust, gradually declined under the combined influences of his army exposures and great domestic afflictions, he was thus forced to relinquish his professional work and sought relief in travel, but a severe attack of pneumonia, in Paris, added another blow to his enfeebled physique. He died at Santa Barbara, California, May 13, 1872, in the 38th year of his age.

The following tribute is taken from *The Boston Advertiser* :

"He was one of those rare characters of whom it is difficult to say enough, and yet to apparently preserve the bounds of a decent moderation: for of him it might truly be said that he was one man out of ten thousand. Indeed, it was impossible to know him and to feel toward him as toward most other men: he seemed made of a finer and more happily compounded clay. His character was remarkable for a development of qualities not usually found in combination, his modesty was only exceeded by his innate self-respect: he was as conspicuous for his gentleness as for courage, and the beautiful simplicity of his nature did not detract from his remarkable decision of character. He possessed in a singular degree many of the most lovable feminine attributes in happy combination with the nobler characteristics of the best class of men. Never physically strong, he yet had a decided power of command; with the sweetest and gentlest of tempers he combined a marked faculty of imposing his will upon others and of evolving order out of chaos. The absence in him of all spirit of boisterous self-assertion stood in the way of a more general appreciation; but if ever any man possessed the qualities of a true knight, a Bayard, fearless and above reproach, they were possessed by him. Nor were these merely the fancied attributes of partial friends. This man had been tried as few men ever are tried, and all these qualities he had himself showed: quietly, unostentatiously, in the simple way of duty, but where great interests depended on his conduct, in the face of the enemy and directly under the eyes of the highest military commanders. The outside world knew little of him, for a simple sense of duty bore too prominent a part for that in the conduct of his life: he was no self-seeker, nor did he ever think to spare himself. He had an instinctive, almost feminine perception, and impulsive dislike of a shirk and his contempt for cant and hypocrisy was such, and he tried so little to conceal it, that no baser nature could ever have been brought in contact with him without experiencing a realizing sense of inferiority.

"This is not the place, nor is it for me to speak of the awful domestic calamities which, when to associates and necessarily to himself his life seemed full of happiest promise, suddenly fell upon him and physically crushed him. In the midst of a household wreck, which his friends could hardly nerve themselves to contemplate, he himself was morally and mentally the same: ever the gentle, manly, uncomplaining, and unconscious hero. He never whined, he could not be demoralized. He lost everything. Children, wife, health, career, interest in life—all were swept away with a savage swiftness which made it seem as if Providence intended to try him to the utmost. He came forth refined gold from the furnace of affliction. For himself his death is not untimely: he had done a good day's work and he had done it well: the moral spring of his life was broken and existence had long been a losing fight saddened by physical decline. For his life-time friends the loss is one which can never again be made good. A fragrant memory of other days is gone, and a portion of bright sunshine is taken away from the future. The light grows long. The war of the rebellion made fearful gaps among the best and noblest of our generation. Dalton fell a victim to it not less than those who died on the field of battle. The seeds of the disease which have just now terminated his

life on the Pacific slope were contracted in the swamps and hospitals of the Chickahominy, and they quietly bided their time, awaiting the sure occasion for their development. He has joined those others with whom we studied and at whose side he fought. But whatever fortune may in the future await the sadly diminished circle of Harvard friends, countrymen and students of seventeen years ago, it will be no small thing to remember that in youth it was the privilege of some of them to have been the associates, and perhaps to have enjoyed the intimacy, of such possibilities as Charles Russel Lowell, Wilder Dwight, Stephen George Perkins, and, in his own elements best of all, of Edward Barry Dalton.

DEVENDORF, EDWARD, was born January 2d, 1820, in the town of Oppenheim Montgomery (now Fulton) County, State of New York. At the age of seven years, in consequence of the death of his father, he was thrown upon his own resources, and compelled to live with strangers. At the age of eighteen he attended the Fairfield Academy, at Fairfield, Herkimer County, New York, working during the summer months to pay for his schooling during the winter. When he arrived at the age of twenty-two he began the study of medicine with James McNaughton, M. D., of Albany, N. Y., and attended lectures at the Albany Medical College for the term of three years, graduating January 21st, 1845. Immediately after graduating he commenced practice at Southville, Herkimer County, N. Y. While there he held the office of Superintendent of Schools for Herkimer County, and also filled, by appointment, the position of surgeon in the 133th Regiment Infantry, N. G. S. N. Y. In 1849, resigning his positions, he came to Brooklyn, (E. D.), then Williamsburgh, where he continued to practice medicine until his death. While here he was appointed to the Williamsburgh Dispensary, but after a few years resigned the position. He was a member of the Medical Association of the Eastern District of Brooklyn. At the time of his death he resided at 518 Grand street, Brooklyn, E. D., N. Y. His last professional act was an act of charity. While attending a poor family afflicted with typhus fever, he contracted the disease, which terminated his life, after a short but severe illness, on the 13th of November, 1871.

FORRESTER, JAMES, Jr., the son of James C. Forrester, a well-known practitioner of this city, was born in New York, in 1836. His early education was received from private teachers. He entered the New York University, but left shortly after to commence the study of medicine at the College of Physicians and Surgeons, N. Y., from which institution he received his diploma in 1858. He at once commenced the practice of his profession in the office of his father, with whom he remained until his death, which occurred on the 14th of December, 1871, in the 36th year of his age, of Phthisis Pulmaralis.

GARRISON, NELSON A., died at Stony Point, N. Y., Jan. 26, 1872, in the seventy-fourth year of his age. He was born in Brooklyn, in which city he practiced medicine more than forty years. In 1824 he became a licentiate, the first on the list of the Society of Kings County, and joined that Society the following year; and was an office-bearer thereof during several years. An honorary doctorate in medicine was conferred upon him by the regents of the University in 1855. A few years since he retired from active practice, and removed to his late home in Rockland county.

GORHAM, HENRY CLAY, died at Canandaigua, N. Y., on the 6th of March, 1871, in the twenty-seventh year of his age—member of the county and village medical societies. In his death the profession has lost a brother of culture and ability, and who gave promise of eminence in the profession of his choice.

GRIFFIN, THOMAS BRADNEY, was born Feb. 22, 1813, in Beverley, Yorkshire, England. He began the study of medicine in his fourteenth year under Dr. Chas. Brereton (still living), and ultimately commenced practice in London. He arrived in this city in 1839, and graduated from the University of New York in 1843. He soon acquired an extensive practice. In 1860 a poisoned wound received from a patient came near proving fatal, and was the means of impairing a vigorous constitution. This accident compelled him to abandon his profession for over a year, and, when he resumed it, it was only to find that his health was permanently shattered. Dr. Griffin died June 21, 1871, after an illness of many weeks, and was interred in Greenwood. He was twice married, and leaves four children, one of whom, Dr. Bradney Griffin, is a practicing physician in this city. Dr. Griffin was of a gentle and cheerful disposition; beloved by his patients, whose interests were always his consideration. He had largely to do with the poorer classes of our metropolis, and by them probably he will the longer be remembered as emphatically a kind and hard-working friend.

GUNN, ALEXANDER N., was the eldest son of Rev. Alex. Gunn, of the Reformed Dutch Church of Bloomingdale, at which place he was born, January 8th, 1811. At the age of fourteen he entered the Sophomore Class of Columbia College, and graduated in 1828, and from the College of Physicians and Surgeons in 1833, and was in the meantime under the special tuition of Doctor Joseph M. Smith. During the cholera of 1832 he was actively engaged in the New York Hospital, under the charge of Dr. Roe. He practised in New York City until May, 1859, when he was appointed Health Officer of the Port of New York by Governor Morgan. He was re-appointed in May, 1861, and remained in office until May, 1864, when he vacated his position by the appointment of Dr. Swinburne by Governor Seymour. In the spring of 1864 he removed to Tarrytown, New York, thinking to enjoy the quiet of a country home, but his ardent devotion to his profession, and the love of an active, useful life, led him to return to the city in a little over a year. In the summer of 1866 he became identified with the American Popular Life Insurance Company of New York, as one of its corporators and directors, and remained as Surgeon-in-Chief of said Company until within a few weeks of his death. Such is the brief chronological outline of the professional life of one who was eminent for his usefulness, filling with honor and ability every post that was assigned him, a man of culture and refinement, and possessed to the fullest degree that gentleness of charity which diffused itself through the whole work of his life. At one time he told a professional friend that he always directed his collector not to send a bill to any widow who was dependent on her own labor for sustenance. It was owing to his long practice, the amount of time consumed in visiting the poor, that prevented his leaving behind him any contribution to the literature of our profession. Dr. Gunn, during the past few years of his life, did not enjoy good health; he had frequent though slight attacks of apoplexy, and on the evening of December 20th, 1871, upon ascending to his room, prior to visiting a dying patient, fell to the floor in a convulsion, and died the following morning at ten o'clock, remaining unconscious from the time of attack until his death. His funeral took place on Sunday, the 24th of December, from the Fourth Avenue Presbyterian Church, Rev. Dr. Crosby, pastor, and was largely attended by professional friends and patients, and the many tearful eyes and sorrowful faces that

attended to pay their last tribute to his memory, showed how much they esteemed, and how sadly they mourned the loss of their old physician. Dr. Gunn was married in August, 1833, to Amelia Gilbert, daughter of Garret Gilbert, of New York city. Four children were born to them, all of whom survive.

HAIGH, THOMAS, son of Richard, a farmer of Dearborn, Wayne Co., Michigan, and Betsey (Williams) Haigh, was born at Seneca Falls, Seneca Co., N. Y., March 14th, 1840. His parents were natives of England, and came to this country from Wakefield, in Yorkshire. His academic and collegiate education was acquired at the academy at Seneca Falls, and at Lansing, Michigan. From the Michigan State Agricultural College he received the degree of B. S. in 1862. Dr. Manly Miles was his instructor in medicine until he came to New York, and there he pursued his studies under Profs. John Torrey and Geo. Thurbur, and Dr. Alexander Hadden. In 1861 he attended lectures at the College of Pharmacy. The College of Physicians and Surgeons, where he also attended lectures, conferred upon him the degree of Doctor of Medicine in 1865. That he was a faithful student is attested by the fact that he took the first Faculty prize of \$50 for his thesis. It was upon "The Ordeal Bean of Calabar," and was printed in the *American Journal of Pharmacy*. His connection with the College did not cease with his graduation. He became the assistant of Professor Dalton, and in the fall course delivered lectures on the chemistry and physiology of the urine. From 1865 to 1869, when, on account of his health, he moved to Passaic, N. J., he spent most of his time in the practice of his profession in this city. He was attached to the North Eastern Dispensary as attending and visiting physician. In 1864 he was appointed Assistant Surgeon U. S. Army. Early in the war he, with several other students, joined an engineer corps for service under General Fremont, but they saw no actual field service, as the General was recalled. He was a member of the County Society, and also took an active part in organizing the Yorkville Medical Association. In the fall of 1870 Dr. Haigh went to Florida and passed the winter at Mellonville, hoping thereby to get the better of consumption, which had already made an alarming advance. The change brought an improvement, but dysentery soon reduced his strength, and he was glad to be in New York before his death, which took place June 8th, 1871, at the age of 30 years. He was buried in Clark Grove Cemetery, Dearborn, Mich. Dr. Haigh married Emma Frances, daughter of Wait and Martha (Bockover) Wells, May 28th, 1867. They had no children. Prof. George Thurbur, who knew the doctor well, writes that "at the College he was especially interested in animal and vegetable physiology, chemistry, and such studies as would later prove useful to him in a medical course." He also says: "As a student he was more noted for a knowledge of the subject than of the lesson, and was always thoroughly prepared in recitations upon subjects that suited his tastes." At a later day he retained his reputation as an accomplished scientific scholar among his professional associates, who esteemed him highly for his worth and attainments.

HART, E. J., of Elmira, N. Y., was born in Berlin, Ct., May 8th, 1787, and he died in Elmira, N. Y., October 22, 1871, in the 85th year of his age. He began the practice of medicine in Goshen, Ct., but moved to Elmira, N. Y., in 1821, where he continued in active practice till the day before his death. He was one of the four founders of the Chemung County Medical Society, and of the Elmira Academy of Medicine. He maintained through his eminently useful and active life a spotless personal and professional character, and his gray hairs went down to the grave crowned with honor.

KEESE, HOBART, son of Rev. William Linn and Mary Matilda (Drake) Keese, was born at Albany, N. Y., September 18th, 1831. His father, a member of an old New York family, was a clergyman of St. Paul's Church, Albany, N. Y., and at Trinity Church, New Haven, Ct.

Dr. Keese received his education as a school boy at the Hopkins Grammar School and other schools in New Haven, Ct. Under the late Prof. Charles Hooker he studied medicine, and received his diploma at the Yale Medical School in 1855. He began practice in New Haven, and, after a tour in the old world as far as Egypt, he returned to his professional labors in this city about the year 1859, his office being then and subsequently at 63 W. 37th street. For several years he was one of the attending physicians at the North Western Dispensary.

Poor health hindered him from an active pursuit of a profession to which he was strongly attached. Not less than eight years did he struggle with a disease which mastered him. Several winters he passed in Minnesota; he crossed the ocean; and he ceased not to hope and to labor for his health's sake until within a day of his death, from consumption, Nov. 7th, 1871. He was buried in the old burying-ground at New Haven, Ct.

Dr. Keese was not known to many of our profession, but the few with whom he was brought in intimate relations, appreciated his ability, his integrity and refinement.

KLAWITTER, DAVID RICHARD, was born in Danzig, Prussia, on the 15th of July, 1839. His professional studies were pursued in the universities of Jena and Griefswald, from the latter of which he received his degree in April, 1863. About six years later he came to this country, and soon took up his residence at 740 Flushing avenue, Brooklyn, where he abode until his decease, on the 30th of October, 1871. His fatal malady was acute disquamative nephritis, followed by an unusually painful train of symptoms. He was unmarried, and without a near relative in the country, but he leaves behind him many friends, especially in the profession; among the latter he was favorably known as a specialist in diseases of the eye.

LEE, CHARLES ALFRED, who died at his residence in Peekskill, N. Y., February 14, 1872, aged seventy-one, derived his blood from the Lees and Browns of Massachusetts and Connecticut. His ancestors in both branches extend back and occupy distinguished positions in America for more than two centuries. In collateral descent his paternal ancestors are allied to Governor Bradford's descendants. The earliest lineal paternal ancestors of Dr. Lee in America, that can be traced with certainty, are:

1. John Lee, who died in Massachusetts in 1690, and had for wife Mary Hart, of Farmington.
2. David Lee, of Coventry, son of the former, who married Lydia Strong, daughter of J. J. J. Strong, and grand-daughter of Elder John Strong.
3. Rev. Jonathan Lee, born July 4, 1718, who was a man of great force of character and influence, and the first Congregational minister in Salisbury, and was twice married: first, to Elizabeth Metcalf, great-great-grand-daughter of Governor Bradford, September 3, 1744; second, to Love Brinkerhoff, 1762; had eleven children, and died October 8, 1788.
4. Samuel Lee, Esq., of Salisbury, who married Elizabeth Brown, of Pittsfield, daughter of Captain Jacob Brown, of Sandisfield, an officer of the Revolutionary War, who accompanied Arnold in his fruitless expedition through the wilderness, up the Kennebeck, against Canada, in 1776 and died in Quebec March 14, 1778; and niece of the gallant Colonel John Brown, who was killed in battle while fighting for American liberty, October 19, 1780, aged thirty-six.

Charles Alfred Lee, son of Samuel, was born at Salisbury, Conn., March 3, 1801. Much of his boyhood was passed in the family of his uncle, the late Elisha Lee, Esq., of Sheffield, Mass. Here he fitted for college, becoming a member of the Lenox Academy, at the age of sixteen. One year later he entered the sophomore class of Williams College, Mass. While at college he was noted for his great industry, systematic habits of study, strict performance of duties, and for irreproachable morals. On graduating at this institution A. M. in 1822 he received the honorable distinction of being chosen by the faculty to deliver the philosophical oration at the public college commencement. His studies had been prosecuted with a view to entering the Congregational ministry, but the state of his health on leaving college caused his medical advisers to urge him to study medicine, a vocation better calculated to improve his constitution, which had been seriously impaired by long confinement and close study, and from neglect of exercise and inattention to the laws of health.

Accordingly, he commenced the study of medicine with his brother-in-law, the late Luther Ticknor, M. D., of Salisbury, Conn. He attended two courses of lectures at the Berkshire Medical College, at Pittsfield, Mass., where he held the office of demonstrator of anatomy during the winter session, and instructor in botany during the summer course. After receiving the degree of M. D. at this institution, in 1825, he engaged for some time in practice with Drs. Ticknor and Asabel Humphrey, of his native town. In 1827 he removed to the city of New York, where he continued his studies, and engaged actively in practice. In this great and growing city he encountered all the difficulties that usually lie in the path of young men in their efforts to acquire professional business and position. Being governed by correct morals, sound principles of action, with close attention to business, and indomitable perseverance, he was enabled in a short time to overcome all obstacles, and to take his place where his talents and education entitled him to be—in the front rank of the profession.

As a necessity from the organization of his mind, he was a profound thinker, and an enthusiastic, ceaseless worker, enlisting actively in any new measure of a public or professional character that promised in any way to be useful to the community or to elevate the profession of medicine, and ameliorate the condition of those requiring the aid of a physician.

When the Northern Dispensary of New York City was being established, Dr. Lee and Dr. James Stewart were among its most active and most efficient promoters, and to them is largely due the successful founding of this, one of the most useful of the many public charitable institutions of the city. He faithfully discharged the duties of attending physician to this dispensary for over four years, during which time he prescribed for and attended more than four thousand patients annually. On resigning this position he received from the board of directors a unanimous vote of thanks for his very acceptable services, and was chosen chief physician, with the privilege of making all subordinate appointments, supplying medicines, and exercising a general supervision over the establishment, under the board of managers. In a few years the extension of his private practice, which began to engross most of his time, induced him to resign this responsible office, when he was elected one of the consulting physicians, a position he held for many years.

On the 28th of June, 1828, Dr. Lee was united in marriage with Hester Ann Mildeberge, daughter of John A. and Ann (De Witt) Mildeberge, of New York City, by whom he had nine children, only three of whom, all sons, survived.

In 1832, during the first visit of Asiatic cholera, Dr. Lee was appointed physician to Greenwich Cholera Hospital, and also attending-physician to the New York Orphan Asylum. In the latter institution he gave, in the form of lectures, specific instructions to the nurses on hygiene, ventilation, and the laws of health, and how to proceed in case any of the inmates were attacked; and, although there had been two deaths in the house the day preceeding his taking charge, there was not another fatal case among more than one hundred children subsequently seized with the disease. He was indefatigable in his attention to his hospital duties, abandoning for the most part his private practice, sleeping and eating in the hospital, that

his services might be prompt and efficient. During the epidemic, the doctor attended upon and prescribed for nearly one thousand cases of cholera.

From the time Dr. Lee commenced his professional career in the city of New York, up to 1845, he was most assiduously engaged in the practice of his profession, scarcely leaving the city for a single day. At this time, finding his health much impaired, and his nervous system particularly enfeebled from such close and laborious attention to his studies, and the routine duties of his profession, he accepted, by the advice of his professional friends, an appointment to the chair of *Materia Medica* and General Pathology, in the Geneva Medical College, New York. The duties of this professorship required an absence of but eight weeks annually, which, however, gave him some relaxation, and proved beneficial to his health. The remainder of the year was devoted, as usual, to his practice in the city.

The liberality and independence of the doctor's principles were signally illustrated in 1846, while Dean of the faculty, in procuring the admission of Miss Elizabeth Blackwell as a regular student of medicine in the Geneva College. Her admission was after she had applied in vain to most of the medical schools in the principal cities, and when the doctor knew that his course would be likely to provoke criticism unfriendly to the Geneva College and himself.

After the year 1850, Dr. Lee devoted himself chiefly to teaching various branches of medicine in different medical colleges, among which may be named the University of the City of New York; Geneva Medical College; University of Buffalo, medical department; Vermont Medical College, at Woodstock; Maine Medical School, at Brunswick; Berkshire Medical College. Starling Medical College, Columbus, Ohio. The branches taught by him in these different colleges were: Therapeutics and *Materia Medica*; General Pathology, Obstetrics, and Diseases of Females; Hygiene and Medical Jurisprudence.

In addition to the chairs actually filled, Dr. Lee was invited to fill the chair of Theory and Practice of Medicine in the University of the City of New York at the time it was made vacant by the resignation of Meredith Clymer, M. D. The same chair was tendered him in the University of Louisville, Ky., when it became vacant by the death of Daniel Drake, M. D. Existing professional engagements compelled him to decline both of these desirable positions. He also received applications to fill chairs in other colleges.

In 1850, Dr. Lee, in connection with his colleagues, Drs. Hamilton, Flint, Hadley, and Webster, founded the Buffalo Medical School, acting under the charter of the University of Buffalo. He continued to deliver his annual course in this institute until 1870-71, when, at his own request, he was permitted to retire. The trustees at once elected him Emeritus Professor of *Materia Medica* and Hygiene, and at the same time passed unanimously a vote of thanks for his past valuable services to the university. He retained this position to the time of his death. Dr. Lee gave an annual course of lectures in the Maine Medical School for about fourteen years, and in the Geneva College for ten years. He was generally recognized as one of our best American teachers, thoroughly acquainted with the latest and soundest views upon all medical subjects, and never failing to interest his class. He never attempted any rhetorical display, generally reading from his copious notes.

After his college duties became so absorbing, he confined his practice chiefly to one of office consultations, and to consultations with other physicians. His consulting practice, too, was very large in the regions of the medical colleges in other States where he lectured, patients coming to him from long distances. His experience and advice, too, were greatly sought after by medical practitioners. He was always a supporter of the ethics of the profession, and therefore popular with his brother practitioners, which did much to extend his consultation business.

Successful as Dr. Lee undoubtedly was as a teacher, it is by his pen that he has won his highest reputation. As an author and medical writer, he is very widely and favorably known, both in this country and in Europe. He wrote extensively on a great variety of medical and scientific subjects. His "Physiology for the Use of Elementary Schools" was published by the American Common School Society

about 1835. It was subsequently enlarged and published by J. Orville Taylor, of New York, and has passed through ten or more editions. This work answered very well the purpose for which it was written, has had a large sale, and has done much to popularize this important branch of knowledge with the people, and opened the way for its being taught in the common schools and seminaries of learning throughout our country. His "Manual of Geology, for Schools and Colleges," was published by the Harpers in 1835, as one of the volumes of the "Family Library." This had a very extensive sale throughout the United States and the Canadas, and has done much to create a taste for the study of this useful science. In 1843, Dr. Lee was instrumental in establishing the *New York Journal of Medicine and the Collateral Sciences*, a bi-monthly of one hundred and forty-four pages. Owing to the pressure of other engagements, the late Samuel Torrey, M. D., author of a valuable work on the climate of the United States, was engaged to edit the first few volumes. On the death of Dr. Torrey, Dr. Lee assumed the entire management, his name appearing on the title-page of the fourth volume. He continued the journal to the close of the tenth volume, his own pen furnishing much of the original material. It is not saying too much to state that this journal took a high rank in periodical literature, and contributed greatly to the respectability of American medical journalism.

In 1845, Dr. Lee brought out an edition of "Principles of Forensic Medicine," by William A. Guy, M. D., with extensive and valuable notes and additions, adding much to the value of the book. In this labor he had the cooperation and advice of the late Chancellor James Kent.

In 1848, Dr. Lee commenced the most important and laborious professional work of his life—the editing an American edition of Dr. James Copland's "Dictionary of Practical Medicine," issued irregularly in London, in numbers comprising 144 pages of large octavo, double columns. Several attempts, one of which was in Washington, D. C., by Duff Green, had been made to issue an American reprint of this work, but, from one cause or another, all had failed. The editor, though apparently fully occupied with his medical journal, his practice, and his five or six annual courses of lectures in different colleges, undertook the Herculean task of supplying, in the way of notes and additions, all of permanent value to be found in medical journals, monographs, formal treatises, and even manuscript lectures, a task which involved the necessity of supplying himself with complete lists of the American medical periodicals, and the careful search of all known works of native origin relating to the different subjects discussed. The completeness of the American Medical Bibliography, at the end of each article, shows the vast amount of careful and discriminating labor and research expended in this department of the work. This was at the time the heaviest and most expensive medical publication ever undertaken in the United States, and will ever remain, with the extensive notes, a grand and lasting memorial of the indefatigable industry and research of the editor. It was the wonderful completeness and time-saving value of this list that first suggested to the author of this sketch the advantages to the medical man of a comprehensive subject-index to the medical literature of our various American medical journals, a work that is now well in hand. The Dictionary was fifteen years in passing through the press of the Harpers, owing to its slow publication by its author in London. The entire work forms three immense octavo volumes. It is not an exaggeration to say that this forms the most complete and valuable work on the theory and practice of medicine, including etiology, pathology, and therapeutics, ever issued from the English or the American press. Dr. Lee received the hearty thanks of Dr. Copland himself for the able and satisfactory manner in which he had given the American edition to the public.

During the progress of this great work, Dr. Lee brought out other valuable publications, among which was an edition of a learned and practical treatise on "Food and Diet," by Jonathan Pereira, M. D. This enterprise was undertaken at the request of the distinguished author, from whom the American editor received kind acknowledgments and thanks. Besides the extensive notes, over seventy pages of original matter was added by way of appendix. As a matter of justice, it should be

stated that the entire profits of the numerous American editions of the work have been generously assigned by the editor to the author and his heirs.

In 1840, Dr. Lee issued with many valuable notes and an appendix of seventy pages of original matter, an American edition of an English work, entitled "Baenus, an Essay on the Nature, Cause, Effects and Cure of Intemperance," by Ralph B. Grindrod. The additions by the American editor were subsequently, in 1851, incorporated in the English edition of the work. The American profits of this work were also relinquished by Dr. Lee to the British author.

In 1843 he edited and published an edition of A. T. Thomson's "Conspectus" of the London, Edinburgh, and Dublin Colleges, and of the United States Pharmacopœia. To this work he also added many valuable articles and extensive notes.

In 1844, he supervised and revised an edition of the "Pharmacologia, or, the Theory and Art of Prescribing," by J. A. Paris, M. D., which was published by the Harpers.

About twenty-six or twenty-seven years ago, Dr. Lee wrote for the *New York Churchman* at the request of the editor, a series of essays entitled "Medica Sacra," which were published in its weekly columns. They attracted much attention.

Besides the works already mentioned and printed, the doctor prepared, during the last years of his life, a work on the "Indigenous Materia Medica of the United States," which is in Manuscript and would form a volume of about six hundred pages, and would be a valuable contribution to this department of medicine. In addition to those noticed, a number of other useful volumes were written or edited by the subject of this memoir. He was a constant and voluminous contributor to various scientific, literary and professional journals, at home and abroad for more than forty years. His writings on hygiene, the laws of health, temperance, and the influence of alcohol—i. e., liquors—on the human body, were commenced in the year 1828, and continued through various channels to the time of his death.

Dr. Lee was one of the first to detect and call attention to the extensive and dangerous adulteration of malt-liquors in the United States, which, by careful analysis, he demonstrated, in 1834, from ten different samples of Albany ale.

His wide-spread reputation as a forcible writer upon the subject of temperance induced the British Temperance Reform League to invite Dr. Lee, while in England, in 1862, to deliver an address before them at their annual meeting at Exeter Hall, London. His remarks on the occasion gave great satisfaction, and he received a unanimous vote of thanks.

Dr. Lee first visited Europe in 1848, for the purpose of recruiting his health, which had become greatly impaired by his close and severe labors. During this visit he became acquainted with many of the distinguished and leading medical and scientific men of Great Britain and the Continent. He visited all the most noted hospitals and public institutions. He took a special interest in studying the management of institutions for the insane, and wrote a series of papers on this subject, of decided ability, which did much to inform the profession of our country of the improvements introduced into hospitals for the insane. An absence of nine months, with the agreeable society he met, and the tonic of travel, entirely restored him to health, and on his return he at once renewed the routine of his usual duties as teacher, editor, author, and practitioner.

The character of Dr. Lee's mind, and the range of studies that engaged his attention, entitle him to be ranked with a class of medical men, never numerous in any country, such as Rush, Mitchell, Hosack, Francis, Drake, etc. His thoughts took a philosophic range of great scope, manifesting some preference for the natural and exact sciences. This quality of his mind, with his thorough and comprehensive studies, led him to be selected and esteemed as one of the most important medical experts in our country. He was a man of genial disposition, elegant manners, and was affable and courteous to all. He was thoroughly unselfish, and ready at all times to help others; and was particularly the friend and supporter of young men entering the profession. His sympathies were active and humanitarian in their turn, and often brought him before the public.

In the spring of 1862, the second year of the war, Dr. Lee visited Europe to collect

plans, models, and specifications of the best and most recent naval, civil, and military hospitals of Great Britain and the Continent, for the use of the United States Government. In the prosecution of this philanthropic enterprise he was eminently successful. The heads of the War and Navy Departments of Great Britain, with much consideration and promptitude, placed at his disposal accurate maps and drawings, with working plans and specifications of the most approved naval and military hospitals of the kingdom. These, with others, were placed in the archives of the War Department at Washington, and served, no doubt, as valuable models for the erection of similar establishments during the progress of the war. During the same year, while on an extended tour through England, France, Germany, Switzerland, Prussia, Austria, and Italy, he wrote for the *American Medical Times*, of New York, about fifty elaborate and carefully prepared letters, designed to furnish useful and important facts and information to our army and naval surgeons, as well as to practitioners generally, in regard to military and naval hygiene hospitals and hospital hygiene, bringing prominently forward the medical and surgical treatment of patients in the various public charitable institutions of the different countries, and their special arrangements and management. Before leaving England on this tour, Dr. Lee was elected a member of the "British Social Science Congress," then holding its annual session in London, with Lord Brougham as its president. The doctor was unanimously called to preside over the section of the health department of that useful association.

In consequence of the protracted and severe military struggle in which his native country was then unhappily involved, Dr. Lee was induced, late in the fall of 1862, while at Naples, on his way to Egypt and the East, to turn his steps homeward. He reached New York early in 1863, and immediately offered his services to the Government, in the capacity of a surgeon. He was accepted and assigned to duty in a hospital, but, very properly believing that he could be more useful in a wider field than he enjoyed in the subordinate position which had been allotted him, he soon resigned, and accepted a situation as hospital inspector and visitor, in the United States Sanitary Commission's employ. He labored efficiently in this field until the close of the war.

In the spring of 1865, soon after the surrender of General Lee's army, the doctor was engaged for several months throughout the South in collecting materials for "Memoirs of a Sanitary History of the War," particularly as relating to the Confederate armies, with hospital statistics, army diseases, etc., in which he was remarkably successful. A portion of these valuable papers will be found in the "Sanitary Records and Medical History of the War," issued by the United States Sanitary Commission.

In 1850 Dr. Lee purchased a handsome residence in the neighborhood of the Highlands near Peekskill, on the Hudson. He loved domestic retirement and quiet study; and there, with his library and his family around him, he passed much of his time in study and writing, and in the enjoyment of quietude during the closing years of his life.

For the last ten years he has taken a very active interest in some of the great humanitarian movements, especially in instituting and encouraging reform in the management and care of the chronic insane of the United States. As a large majority of this unfortunate class are quiet and harmless, and able to perform considerable bodily labor, he was opposed to shutting them up in close and crowded wards and cells, but favored their distribution under the care of suitable attendants and keepers, in simple, cheap, and comfortable cottages, after the French system, where they may enjoy open-air life, and a degree of domestic comfort, with sufficient daily exercise to preserve health. These views he had advocated at considerable length in the form of two able reports, one made to the New York State Medical Society, and published in their Transactions for the year 1865; the other as chairman of a committee appointed by the American Medical Association, and contained in their Transactions for 1868.

Dr. Lee was a member of the New York Academy of Medicine, the New York State Medical Society, the American Medical Association, the New York Historical

Society, the New York Lyceum of Natural History, etc., and honorary member of the Connecticut State Medical Society, the Ohio State Medical Society, and a long list of other learned and scientific bodies, both at home and abroad.

In 1835, he became a member of the Episcopal Church, with which he retained a consistent Christian connection, to the time of his death. He was warden of St. Peter's Church at Peekskill for many years, always taking an active interest in its affairs. For a layman he was remarkably well versed in theology, and liberal in his views of religion. Dr. Martyn Payne writes: "I had enjoyed an intimate acquaintance with Dr. Lee for more than forty years, and had the highest esteem for him as a man of the most lofty virtues, and profound religious convictions. His writings attest the comprehensive nature of his scientific and literary acquirements, as well as a vigorous and logical mind."

Dr. Lee was taken ill on the 30th day of January, with endocarditis, and after two weeks of suffering, died, with calmness and Christian hope. His wife and three sons survive him, and were with him during his sickness. His remains have been interred in "Sleepy Hollow Cemetery," at Tarrytown, N. Y. J. M. T.
—*New York Medical Journal*, April, 1872.

LOUNSBERY, SETH STEPHEN, was born in 1838, in Westchester County, New York, where his early schooling was obtained. He graduated in Medicine at the College of Physicians and Surgeons Medical Department, of Columbia College, in 1861. Soon after graduation, he entered the service of the United States, and was appointed Surgeon of the 155th, New York Volunteers, and received high honors for his skill and attention to his regiment, always looking after their wants. At the close of the war, he commenced practice at Mamaroneck, Westchester County, New York, and soon became well-known throughout that and the adjoining counties, as a skilful physician and surgeon. Dr. Lounsbury was greatly esteemed by a large circle of friends, both rich and poor, and to the latter he was always a sympathizer, counsellor and friend. He died at Bedford, Westchester County, April 26, 1872, aged 31 years, of abdominal disease, the sequel of his army Typho-malarial.

MCCARTY, JAMES J., lately of Brooklyn, N. Y., died at Jacksonville, Florida, on the 23d of December, 1871, aged 26 years. He was a native of Brooklyn, where he spent the early years of his life. In 1868 he was graduated in medicine from the College of Physicians and Surgeons, Medical Department of Columbia College, New York, and about one year later he was admitted to the Brooklyn City Hospital, as house-surgeon. After leaving the hospital, he began the practice of medicine at 78 Bond street, where he resided until the summer of 1871, at which time he was compelled by the progress of pulmonary disease to relinquish professional duty and seek relief by a residence in the South, where he remained until his death.

MEYERS, J., died at the Charity Hospital, Blackwells Island, July 6, 1871, of Typhoid Fever, contracted in the discharge of his duty as an interne of that institution, aged 22 years and six months. He was a graduate in Medicine from the Medical Department of the University of the City of New York, in 1871.

MULHALLON, WILLIAM E., was born near Bath, Pennsylvania, May 24, 1819. He graduated at Jefferson Medical College, Philadelphia, Pa., in 1841. He commenced the practice of medicine in the town of Asbury, New Jersey, where he

remained four years. He removed to Brooklyn, N. Y. in 1845, where, until within a few months of his death he was actively engaged in the arduous duties of a large general practice. In the summer of 1871 he began to suffer from nervous asthenia, and in the fall was obliged to give up all professional work. During the winter and spring his strength failed gradually until he gently passed away on the 8th of May, 1872. The post-mortem revealed Hypertrophy of the Heart. The funeral services were held in the Lafayette Avenue Church, and attended by the members of the King's County Medical Society, of which he had been a member since 1859, and by hundreds of others whose tears and sad faces testified their sorrow at the loss of one who had been to them a dear and true friend. Dr. Mulholland's practice was chiefly obstetrical, for which he was well adapted by his noble qualities of mind and heart. In manner he was genial and gentlemanly, towards all he was cordial and kind. He carried his characteristic cheerfulness and good humor everywhere, no call for his assistance or demand for his services, no matter how unseasonable the hour or poor the patient, ever betrayed him into any expression of impatience, but he seemed always ready to go, and went with an alacrity as cheerful as if it cost him no effort. His sympathy was such that into his ear were poured all confidences and anxieties. So he became especially endeared to a large circle. He was highly esteemed among his professional brethren for his qualities as a physician, and for his uniform courtesy and honorable bearing. His unusual height, military coat, ruffled shirt and dignity of manner made him one to be noticed and remembered. He was known and respected over the entire city, even the school children seeing him coming ran to him with their pleasant salutations, well knowing they would receive equally cheerful greetings in return.

SANGER, WILLIAM W., was born in Connecticut, August 10th, 1819. He commenced the study of medicine at Wheeling, Va., in 1842. He soon after removed to this city and matriculated at the College of Physicians and Surgeons, New York, graduating from that institution in 1846. He was then appointed assistant at Bellevue Hospital, and subsequently was the first resident physician at Blackwell's Island. He afterward resigned and visited Europe, and in 1853 was reappointed to his former place. It was during this seven years tenure of the office that he made his celebrated investigation of the "social evil," which his position gave him such unusual opportunities of studying, and the result of it is shown in his work on "The History of Prostitution." In 1860 he again resigned, and devoted himself to his private practice. He died, May 8th, 1872, after a long and painful illness, in the 53d year of his age.

SCHILLING, ERNST, was born in Salzberg, Austria, December 25th, 1809, and was a graduate from the University of Vienna. He was connected with the State Emigrant Hospital, Ward's Island, for many years, as the following resolutions show:—

At a meeting of the Commissioners of Emigration of the State of New York, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That this Board have heard with much regret of the death of Dr. Ernst Schilling, the consulting physician of the State Emigrant Hospital, Ward's Island.

Resolved, That in his connection with the emigrant hospitals, as a member of the Visiting Medical Board, from 1850 to 1855, and as consulting physician from 1866, the Commissioners of Emigration bear testimony to his great professional skill, as well as the zeal and fidelity displayed by him in the performance of his official duties.

Resolved, That this Board extend their warmest sympathy to his family in the great bereavement which has befallen them.

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions, signed by the President, be transmitted to the family of the deceased.

RICHARD O'GORMAN, President.

About three weeks before his death he was attacked with Pneumonia, and died suddenly on the 23th of April, 1872, of Congestion of the Brain. Dr. Schilling was twice married. Two daughters survive him.

SMITH, DAVID AUGUSTINE, the son of David and Sarah Ann (Bidder) Smith, was born in this city, June 21, 1843. His early education was pursued with difficulty, owing to feeble health, at Grammar School, No. 40, from which, after graduating, he entered the introductory class of the New York Free Academy, now the College of the City of New York, where he remained until the close of the sophomore year. In 1862 he commenced the study of medicine in the office of his father, the late Dr. David Smith, formerly a well-known practitioner of this city, and matriculated at the College of Physicians and Surgeons, Medical Department of Columbia College, New York, from which institution he graduated in 1866. He commenced the practice of medicine immediately after graduation. He died in this city, April 9th, 1872, in the 29th year of his age.

SMITH, MONTROSS LESLIE, son of Lewis R. and Augusta (Craft) Smith, was born in Bedford, Westchester County, New York, July 1, 1840. Educated in the common schools, Lodi Seminary, Kane County, Illinois, and the Mount Kisco Institute, he began the study of medicine July 9, 1860, in the office and drug store of Dr. Michael Moss, in Paterson, New Jersey, attending lectures at the College of Physicians and Surgeons during the winters of 1862-3 and 4, where he graduated in the spring of 1864, commencing practice at No. 277 Henry street, May 1st of the same year, and continuing till his death, which occurred July 18, 1871, at the age of 31. No autopsy was held, but the diagnosis of acute Bright's disease, with Fatty Liver and Endocarditis was made by the attending physicians. There was also supposed to be an Abscess of the Brain, which discharged from the ear. He was physician to several Jewish societies, member of the American Medical Association, Medical Society of the County of New York, an active member of the East River Medical Association, of which he was one of the original founders, and was also a frequent contributor to a number of scientific journals. Dr. Smith was a man universally esteemed both in and out of his profession for his scholarly, gentlemanly, and social qualities, and was noted especially for his charity to poor patients and others in need of his aid. The East River Medical Association attended his funeral in a body, and presented resolutions of condolence to his relatives, which will be found in the minutes of the association. His religious convictions were most in sympathy with the Methodists, with whom he had more frequently worshipped. Being unmarried, his nearest relatives were a mother and brother. The remains were taken to Pine's Bridge, Westchester County, New York, for burial.

SMITH, SAMUEL ST. JOHN, was the son of the late Rev. Theophilus Smith, of New Canaan, Conn. He graduated at the College of Physicians and Surgeons Medical Department of Columbia College, N. Y., in 1866. He commenced the practice of his profession in this city soon after graduation, and in 1868 removed to Perth Amboy, N. J. He died in Providence, R. I., January 4th, 1872, in the 33th year of his age.

TODD, HANFORD COMSTOCK, was born February 17th, 1832, at Norwalk, Fairfield Co., Conn. His ancestry were of the good old New England stock. He attended school until the age of sixteen, and was of a studious disposition. His career began as a compositor in the rooms of the New York *Express*. He was subsequently engaged in the office of the New York *Evening Post*. His great ambition, however, had always been to study medicine, and as soon as practicable he devoted all his energies in this direction.

He graduated at the College of Physicians and Surgeons, New York, March 4th 1853. Having received his diploma, he attended a full course of lectures for another year, and then passed acceptably an examination before the U. S. Naval Medical Board at Philadelphia. Ascertaining, however, that quite a long time would elapse before he could be assigned to duty, he determined to establish himself in private practice. Dr. Todd located, in the latter part of the year 1851, at Warwick Court House, Va. He was soon stricken down with billious remittent fever. For weeks his life was despaired of, and on his recovery he found it requisite to return to the north.

In 1855, at the recommendation of Dr. Willard Parker, he was appointed resident physician of the Westchester County Alms-House and Insane Asylum, which position he retained for two years. He then settled at Dobbs' Ferry, on the Hudson continuing, however, for some years, his connection with the institution above-mentioned, as visiting and consulting physician.

His practice increased and became quite large. It can truthfully be said of him that he never refused to visit the sick when called upon. Dr. Todd was a member of the Westchester County Medical Society, and for one year acted as its Secretary. He was a Communicant in the Protestant Episcopal Church.

Incessant labor seriously affected his health, but he allowed himself no time for recuperation, although never physically strong, and perfectly aware of the danger involved. The strain at length became too great, reason gave way, and on August 1st, 1870, after a prostration of only ten days, he died. The cause of death was tuberculae meningitis, complicating tuberculosis of longer standing. He was buried in Sleepy Hollow Cemetery at Tarrytown.

Thus in the prime of manhood, leaving a widow and eight infant children (six sons and two daughters), died an earnest, indefatigable laborer in the cause of humanity.

WEBB, JOHN S., son of Dr. Edwin Webb, of Hempstead, N. Y., died at the Kings County Hospital, Flatbush, N. Y., May 3, 1872, in the 23d year of his age, of a malignant fever, contracted in the service of this institution. His name appears in the list of graduates of the College of Physicians and Surgeons Medical Department of Columbia College, for 1872, and he had scarcely entered on the duties of his professional career, when he was cut off by the grim spoiler, Death.

WELLES, GARDNER, was born in the town of Gilead, Tolland county, Conn., on the 28th day of August, 1784. After reading medicine for about two years in his native State, he came to Cherry Valley, Otsego county, N. Y., in 1807, and completed his preliminary professional studies, remaining there about two years, in the office of the late Dr. Joseph White, of that village, one of the most learned physicians and celebrated surgeons of his time. On the first day of November, 1809, Dr. Wells was licensed to practice medicine by the Otsego Medical Society, and the same fall and early winter following, attended a course of medical lectures at Columbia College, in the city of New York, and from thence in the spring of 1810, a young man of twenty-six, started out on horseback, to seek his fortune, not knowing where—and located in the town of Junius, in this county, an entire stranger,

in June of that year, where he soon after became a partner with the late Dr. Linus Ely. In 1812 he was commissioned by the then Governor Daniel D. Tompkins, as a Surgeon of the 71st Regiment of New York Infantry, and went to the Niagara frontier and remained there during most of the years 1812, 1813 and 1814, until the close of the war. For the services then rendered he received, a few days before his death, a pension of seventy-seven dollars. *Tardy Justice!* In 1816 he removed to Waterloo, Seneca county, then a hamlet, and the same year completed the dwelling where he after resided, and died. He died February 18th. 1872. His amiable and accomplished wife, who was a sister of the late Hon. Philo C. Fuller, died in 1849, since which time he has remained unmarried. They have left surviving three children: Dr. Samuel R. Welles and Mrs. William Magee of this village, and the Rev. Edward R. Welles, D. D., of Red Wing, Minnesota. Dr. Welles has held various public positions repeatedly, Justice of the Peace, Supervisor of the town, President of the village, Curator for many years of Geneva Medical College, and in 1839 was the member of Assembly from Seneca County. He was one of the first two of the Wardens of St. Paul's church, Waterloo, elected such in 1818, and of which church he was to his death, an exemplary and consistent member. He attended on Christmas day, and then and there for the last time publicly partook of the Holy Communion. In politics he was ever a Democrat of the Jeffersonian, Wright and Marcy school. In business he was a man of marked integrity, fairness and justice. In social life he was pure, kind, modest and unassuming, never obtrusive nor ungentlemanly. He loved his profession not for emoluments only, but for the opportunities it afforded for good. For thirty years after commencing his practice he was a close student, and for fifty years he had a large practice. He continued in active practice until past "four score years." Gentle, sympathizing and tender in the delicate duties of his profession, his skill and services have assisted many into the world; while his care and knowledge as physician and surgeon have relieved the sufferings and saved the lives of many in all stages of existence. Many mothers associate him in memory with their first born. Professionally he was the soul of honor, despised trickery, and never countenanced a professional discourtesy. He was a kind man. No man or woman was too poor to command his best professional labors by day or by night, pay or no pay. But "the old doctor" has gone, having lived to a good old age and seen the wilderness where he located in his youth, "blossom as the rose," and the log cabins of 1810, displaced for the palatial residences of 1870. On Thursday after Christmas he received a fall while walking in his yard, which was the immediate cause of his death, and from which he suffered intensely, without a murmur, until his spirit returned to the God who gave it. We know he lived an honest man; we believe he died a Christian.

WINTER, ENOCH TENNY, the fifth son and tenth child of Benjamin Winter, a captain upon General Washington's Staff during the war of the Revolution, was born in Danbury, N. H., September 19th. 1806. His mother Hannah, a native of Rowley, now Georgetown, Mass., and a daughter of William Searle, was descended from a family somewhat prominent in colonial annals.

Dr. Winter's preferences being decidedly for the ministry, we find him after graduation from the New Hampton Literary and Theological Seminary, in charge of the first Baptist Church at Bradford, N. H., having been ordained in March, 1831. In the following year he assumed the pastoral care of a congregation at Heniker, N. H., where he remained until 1835, during which time he accepted another call to Cavendish, Vermont. Here he remained till 1838, when he removed to Fredericksburgh., Va., to become the pastor of a church in that city. An enthusiastic devotion to his duties, however, entailed a loss of his vocal powers, and prepared him for a change of avocation. His innate benevolence inclined him towards the medical profession, and under the advice of his friend, the late Beverly R. Wellford, who subsequently became his first preceptor, this inclination grew into a fixed

determination. After a collegiate course at Yale College, from which he graduated in 1845, and a few months' residence in Williamsburgh, now Brooklyn, E. D., N. Y., he settled in this city as the Superintendent of the New York Orphan Asylum, a position which he acceptably filled until 1848, when he began his active medical career.

Dr. Winter's practice was largely obstetrical, and being chiefly among the poor, was more exacting than lucrative. His self-abnegation in the line of duty, and his characteristic devotion to those organizations having for their object the amelioration of the condition of the poor severely taxed his physical powers, and laid the foundation of those cerebral disorders which at last compassed his death. As one of the founders, subsequently President, and then a Director of the Third Avenue Savings Bank, Dr. Winter contributed valuable services, without pecuniary reward. A member of several missionary and bible societies, he was distinguished for his zeal.

Some time during 1847 he was stricken down by apoplexy, but the effusion being small, he happily recovered under the care of Drs. A. V. Williams and Willard Parker. A second attack of a like character, but milder in degree, prostrated him upon a Williamsburgh ferry boat a year afterwards. From this, however, after remaining in a comatose condition for two days, he also recovered, without any unpleasant sequelæ. His feeble health, however, dated from a pneumonia, typhoid in character, with which he was attacked in 1863. His energy and determination, however, did not suffer him to withdraw entirely from active practice until within a year of his death, which occurred April 27th, 1871.

Dr. Winter's final illness was short in duration. After complaining of intense cephalalgia while at luncheon, he passed into a semi-conscious condition, which continued for about twenty-four hours, when death closed the scene.

His remains repose in the New Haven Cemetery. He leaves an only child, the wife of Dr. Garret Cosine, at whose residence in Harlem he breathed his last.

**Act to Regulate the Practice of Pharmacy and the Sale of Poisons, in
the City and County of New York.**

The new law in regard to druggists, their prescription clerks, and the sale of poisons, requires them to register their names with the *Board of Health* within thirty days after their organization, at a cost of two dollars for proprietors, and one dollar for their clerks. It prohibits all persons not graduates or licensed pharmacists, from opening or conducting drug stores, and restrains junior assistants and apprentices from preparing prescriptions until they have passed an examination before the Board of Pharmacy. It also regulates the sale of Poisons.

The duration of human pregnancy is about 275 days. This is subject to some variation, and the longest period is still undetermined. As labor occurs in the larger proportion of cases between 270 and 290 days from the last menstruation it is usual to reckon either from the first or last day of this period, taking as the mean 280 days, or a little over nine calendar months. For this approximate calculation the first day of the menstrual period may be used as being more readily ascertained. The table presents at a glance the beginning and end of 280 days for every day of the year. Find the date of menstruation in the upper line of the horizontal column and the figure below, with the corresponding month, will indicate 280 days. In leap-year, if the period of pregnancy includes February the time for labor will be one day earlier than that given in the table.

HACK FARES.

We would advise all persons using cabs or coaches to make a bargain in the presence of a witness, and suggest that very advantageous terms can be frequently made.

The prices or rates of fare to be taken by, or paid to, the owners or drivers of cabs, hackney coaches or carriages, shall be as follows:

For conveying a passenger any distance not exceeding ONE MILE, fifty cents; for conveying two passengers the same distance, seventy-five cents, or thirty-seven and a half cents each; and for every additional passenger thirty-seven and a half cents.

For conveying a passenger any distance exceeding a mile, and within two miles, seventy-five cents; and for every additional passenger, thirty-seven and a half cents.

For conveying one passenger to *Fortieth street*, and remaining half an hour, and returning, one dollar and a half; and for every additional passenger fifty cents.

For conveying one passenger to *Sixty-first street*, and remaining three-quarters of an hour, and returning, two dollars; and for every additional passenger, fifty cents.

For conveying one passenger to *Eighty-sixth street*, and remaining one hour, and returning, two dollars and a half; and for every additional passenger, seventy-five cents.

For conveying one or more passengers to *Harlem*, and returning, with the privilege of remaining three hours, five dollars; or to the *High Bridge*, five dollars, with the same privilege.

For conveying one or more passengers to *Kings Bridge*, and returning, with the privilege of keeping the carriage all day, five dollars.

For the use of a hackney coach or carriage, *by the day*, with one or more passengers, five dollars.

For the use of a hackney coach or carriage, *by the hour*, with one or more passengers, with the privilege of going from place to place, and stopping as often as may be required, one dollar an hour.

In all cases, where the hiring of a hackney coach or carriage is not, at the time thereof, specified to be by the day or hour, it shall be deemed to be by the mile.

For children between two and fourteen years of age, half price is only to be charged; and for children under two years of age, no charge is to be made.

Whenever a hackney coach or carriage shall be detained, excepting as aforesaid, the owner or driver shall be allowed at the rate of seventy-five cents an hour.

For attending a funeral within the lamp and watch district, two dollars, and to the Potterfield, three dollars; which charges shall include for the necessary detention and returning of passengers.

Every driver or owner of a hackney coach, carriage or cab, shall carry, transport, and convey in or upon his coach, carriage or cab, in addition to the person or persons therein, one trunk, valise, saddle-bag, carpet-bag, portmanteau or box, if he be requested so to do, for each passenger, without charge or compensation therefor; but for every trunk or such other articles above-named, more than one for each passenger, he shall be entitled to demand and receive the sum of six cents.

CENTRAL PARK.

The rates of fare to be charged for the use of coaches shall be as follows: All around the Park, with the privilege of keeping the coach two hours, four dollars; principal parts of the the Park, three dollars; to casino and lake, and return, two dollars; when engaged by the hour, two dollars per hour: when for three or more hours, each one dollar and fifty cents per hour.

Drivers of coaches hired to drive in the Park, are required to wear a badge displayed on the left breast, in the shape of a shield, not to exceed two inches in diameter, and to have the number of his coach thereon, and to be worn continually when such coaches are waiting for hire.

In case of disagreement as to distance or price, the same shall be determined by the mayor.

The owner of any hackney coach or carriage shall not demand or receive any pay for the conveyance of any passenger, unless the number of the carriage, and the rates and prices of fare, are conspicuously placed in the coach.

The owner or driver of any hackney coach, or carriage, shall not be entitled to receive any pay from any person from whom he shall have demanded any greater price or rates than he may be authorized to receive, as aforesaid.

Upon the trial of any cause commenced for the recovery of any of the aforesaid prices or rates, it shall be incumbent upon the plaintiff or plaintiffs in such action, to prove that the number and prices, or rates were placed and fixed in the coach as above provided, at the time the services were rendered, for which this suit may be brought.

No owner or driver of any hackney coach or carriage in the city of New York shall ask, demand, or receive any larger sum than he or they may be entitled to receive, as aforesaid, under the penalty of ten dollars for every such offence, to be sued for and recovered from the owner or owners, or driver of any such hackney coach or carriage, severally and respectively.

POSTAL TABLES, & c.

DOMESTIC POSTAGE.

Mail matter is now transmitted to all parts of the United States at uniform rates. The single rate of postage on all domestic mail letters throughout the United States is three cents per half ounce or fraction thereof. The rate of postage on drop letters, at offices where free delivery by carrier is established, is two cents per half ounce or fraction of a half ounce: at offices where such free delivery is not established, the rate is one cent. All transient matter *must* be prepaid by stamps. Unpaid letters will be sent immediately to the Dead Letter Office, Washington. Letter postage is to be charged on all handbills, circulars or other printed matter which shall contain any manuscript writing whatever. *Daguerotypes*, when sent in the mail, are to be charged with letter postage by weight. *Photographs* on cards, paper, and other flexible material (not in cases) can be sent at the same rate as miscellaneous printed matter, viz.: two cents for each four ounces or fraction thereof.

BOOKS not weighing over four pounds—for every four ounces or fractional part of four ounces, four cents.

CIRCULARS—For three or less (issued by one person or company, but may relate to different articles or matter), to one address, two cents; three to six, four cents; six to nine, six cents; nine to twelve, eight cents.

ON MISCELLANEOUS MAILABLE MATTER (embracing all pamphlets, occasional publications, transient newspapers, handbills and posters, book manuscripts and proof-sheets, whether corrected or not, maps, prints, engravings, sheet music, blanks, inflexible patterns, samples and sample cards, phonographic paper, letter envelopes, postal envelopes or wrappers, cards, paper, plain or ornamental photographic representations of different types, seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots and scions,) the postage to be prepaid by stamps, is, on one package to one address, not over four ounces in weight, two cents; four to eight ounces, four cents; eight to twelve ounces, six cents; twelve to sixteen ounces, eight cents.

ON NEWSPAPERS—To actual subscribers, when paid quarterly or yearly in advance, either at the mailing office or office of delivery. Daily, per quarter, three months, thirty-five cents; six times per week, per quarter, three months, thirty cents; tri-weekly, per quarter, three months, fifteen cents; semi-weekly, per quarter, three months, ten cents; weekly, per quarter, three months, five cents; weekly, (one copy only,) sent by the publisher to actual subscribers within the county where printed and published, free.

NEWSPAPERS AND PERIODICALS issued less frequently than weekly, sent to actual subscribers, per quarter (paid quarterly or yearly in advance), semi-monthly, for every four ounces of weight, or part of four ounces, six cents; monthly, for every four ounces of weight or part of four ounces, three cents; quarterly, for every four ounces of weight or part of four ounces, one cent.

All mail matter not sent at letter rates of postage must be so enclosed that the contents can be examined without destroying the wrapper; and no communication in writing or print can be sent with such packages unless paid at the letter rate, excepting that books or packages sent by publishers are allowed to bear their printed card on the wrapper; also a publisher is allowed to send a bill for subscription inclosed in the periodical.

REGISTRATION FEE, on letters, to any part of the United States, 15 cents for each letter, which must be endorsed, on the back, with the name and address of the sender.

MONEY ORDERS, for \$20 or less, 10 cents, and 5 cents extra for each additional \$10 or part of \$10. No order issued for less than \$1 or more than \$50.

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
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
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
