LONDON, March 20.

Dispatches have been received from Lord Hawkebury's office, from Lord Elgin, at Constantinople, and from the Admiralty. They state that Sir Ralph Abercromby had, in all probability, fallen for Egypt before that time, and that the most favourable hopes might be entertained of the expedition; the original plan of the campaign had been changed, and one left subject to accidents, and more prompt in execution. The Turks were to co-operate on the side of El-Ard.

Cora Exchange, March 23.

We had but few fresh arrivals this day of any kind, owing to the late blowing weather. Fine wheat went off readily at an advance of 10s per quarter—Meal 12s 6d to 12s 10d to 13s—Wheat 12s 6d to 13s.

Last night we received Paris papers to the 21st inst. inclusive.

Operations continue to be carried on with the greatest activity by the Spanish Government, for the invasion of Portugal. Twenty nine battalions of infantry, and eight squadrons of cavalry, are ordered to march into the province of Galicia, where there are at present no less than 18,000 troops. The Spaniards expect to be joined by a large body of Republican troops. An Armistice has at length been concluded between France and the King of Naples, under the mediation of the Emperor of Russia. The first effect of this Convention was to order the departure of all the English shipping in all the ports of the Kingdom of Naples, and to order that no English vessels shall in future have access to them. The same order extends to Turkish ships. The English Merchants of Naples have requested a passport to return home.

LONDON, March 28, two o'clock.

We have already stated that Mr. Otto has not yet departed for Banagars, and that Saturday night last they were forwarded from Dover on Monday morning, and reached Paris on Tuesday night. Banagars returned an answer on Wednesday, which was forwarded at Calais on Thursday morning, from whence it was instantly conveyed to Dover in a flag of truce, and reached about midnight. We can assure our readers the contents of this answer are not trifling; and that we are to expect the report we carried this morning, in the brief and political circles, which is, that a Negotiation on the subject of Peace will be opened in due form; and that as soon as circumstances are settled, Lord St. Helens is to repair to Paris as our Minister on that occasion; perhaps it is unnecessary to add, that the private and public character of this Nobleman stands extremely high on our continent.

There are many circumstances which tend to strengthen this report. The pacific language of the new Administration and their friends in the House of Commons is a strong indication of the spirit in which Mr. Otto's notes relative to the French Ministers, and mutual addresses to other occasions—Besides, that a variety of language which used to be levelled at this country in the late negotiations of late given place to a more conciliatory tone.

There is however, another report, which we attach very little credit, viz. that Banagars has declared his determination to treat with this country in conjunction only with his allies—Russia, Denmark, Sweden, Spain, &c.

It is said that Denmark and Sweden are disposed to listen to negotiations, and that the new ministers are ready to convince those powers they will gain more by referring to pacific arrangements, than to the hope of a hostile nature, especially on the point of the Crimea, which is a woman with the existence of our navy, and of course, with the security and prosperity of the British nation.

On Tuesday Mr. Ryder moved, That His Majesty be and be is authorized to permit the importation of foreign goods in neutral bottoms; and also to equalize the duties paid by foreign vessels, to those paid by British bottoms. The amendments were agreed to, and the report ordered to be received to-morrow.

On Thursday last, late at night, we understand that Mr. Jaynes, the Messenger, set off for France. It is said, that he has the honor of dispatches from the Emperor.

Ambrasiator, Count Staremberg; which dispatches are said to be addressed either to Count Cobenzel, or to the French Minister of Foreign Affairs.

By an act of the British Parliament, passed the 24th inst. (which we shall give in to-morrow's Gazette) an elevated bounty is allowed on the importation of American wheat, barley, 7s, oats, peas, corn, &c.

A letter from Petersburg, dated the 9th of Feb. contains the following Official Note—

His Majesty the Emperor of all the Russias being desirous of giving to his faithful Allies a fresh proof of the zeal with which he is animated for the interests of the Maritime Confederacy of the North, and willing to prevent the English from profiting, by means of other nations, any articles necessary for the equipment of their marine, at a moment in which all direct commerce with Russia is prohibited, he judged it expedient to forbid all exports of iron articles from the ports of the Russian Empire. This resolution, which shows that His Imperial Majesty does not hesitate to sacrifice the interest of his Empire to the interests which he is embarked, has been communicated to the Prussian minister, the Swedish Ambassador, and also to the Ministers of Prussia and Denmark.

The Danish, Swedish, and Russian ambassadors at Berlin, had likewise expressed their dissent to the Prussian minister, in favour of objections against the British administration, on account of the hostile treatment of some Swedish vessels on the coast of Norway by British ships of war.

Prince Adolphus of England, in return for a fine time longed at Berlin, under the name of Count Northem.

A Turkish war is the general topic of conversation among the higher circles at Berlin, and it is not without probability to warrant the belief that it will take place. In the first place, large magazines of arms are forming both in Croatia and in the Crimea, at the expense of the Imperial court; the chief articles to be made at Agram, 25ly, General Kitchinwar, who lived with a much distinction in the last war with the Turks, has been nominated chief of the Imperial reserve, and is to continue to file off to Hungary. Ever since it is said at the same time to complete all the Imperial regiments, and reinforce them with two new regiments of horse.

HAMBURG, March 10.

Last Saturday an eminent commercial agent received intelligence from Riga, that the Russian cabinet had just issued two Ukases, one of which allowed free commerce to and from France, with only the French flag to be respected; the second forbids the exportation of all the Russian goods to any other country. The subject of Russia are, however, allowed to fill certain articles to those of Prussia which she wishes, who prove by authentic documents that the goods will not be sent to England, nor purchased on account of any English Agent.

This prohibition is to remain in force until the Russian fleet shall be put to sea; it has been occasioned by information given to the Russian cabinet, that several of their ships, that some foreign agents were to purchase a vast quantity of naval stores for Russia for Great Britain. One of these agents is said to have been arrested, and his property and his money seized and confiscated. An Edict received this morning from Berlin, dated March 8th, brings the very important intelligence, that Lord Cairns, the British minister at that court, has just received the definitive and categorical answer of the British cabinet to the last Prussian note of the 12th inst. and two messengers are said to have brought orders to his lordship, to enter into negotiations with the Prussian ministers, on the subject of the dispute which has arisen between England and the Northern power; it being impossible on account of the losses of his Britannic Majesty, and the great changes made in the British Ministry, to take any decisive resolutions immediately.

MILAN, March 1.
We have received the news by the way of Marcellis and Greece, that Countess's squadron has directed its course towards London. It will be strengthened by the addition of the ships in that harbour, and then pursue its destination.
