ELNSBUR, March 24.

On the 23d in the evening, the English minister, Mr. Drummond, and the envoy plenipotentiary, Mr. V. de Mevius, who were here from Copenhagen. The English minister, who was required immediately to leave Denmark, with them; but they requested to be permitted to remain, and that they would remain in Denmark, on condition that they should be the confederates. Only the English minister, and some other persons, who had particular reasons for it, went on board the English frigate lying here, which about noon sailed for the English fleet near Copenhagen. The rest have not only received permission from the Danish government to remain here, but are even permitted to choose the place where they will reside, and are promised security and full protection from the laws. The day before yesterday, and yesterday, the English fleet was very likely to be seen here. On the day before yesterday in the bay of Copenhagen, the English fleet, in the afternoon, it was the Danish coast, near Gullevej, two (German miles) from Elmsbur. It is said, the admiral has distinguished for sailing into English land, and waits until before he will take any thing further: the truth of the report, however, is much doubted. Yesterday afternoon, the Danish cutter brig, *Albatross*, sailed from Copenhagen, and the inhabitants have received orders from the magistrates to hold themselves in readiness; in short we are prepared to repel any hostile attack with vigor. On the day before yesterday in the bay of Copenhagen, the great Russian fleet of sixty-one sail had arrived at Bornholm; this, however, we were not aware of at the time. It is now said, that not the great fleet of Cronstadt, but the smaller Russian fleet of 12 ships of the line, and five frigates, has already arrived in the vicinity of Copenhagen.

In one of his own's reach; I wish might my journey alone; News that the sea was in distress; I turn at the sound of my gun.

It would be absurd to give a general character of the poems that were published in this volume; yet this is true concerning Mr. Cowper's production, that in all the varieties of his style there is a correctness, the keenness and impetuosity of the flame kind; the fanciful and amiable modification, which always respects unfeeling amon and ornament of language; the fancifully varied the fancy, for which we have derived from a steady and unshaken faith in the dogmas of Christianity.

But his health, however, to that work was no more peculiarly given to Cowper the character of a poet. After an interval of a few years, his Fall was ushered into the world. The occasion that gave birth to it was a trivial one. A lady had requested him to write a piece in blank verse, and gave him the title for his subject. This was expanded into one of the finest moral poems which the English language has ever produced.

It is written in blank verse, of which the construction, though in some respects resembling Milton's, is truly original and characteristic. It is not too flatteringly false definition, was too full of feeling and elevated imagery. It is, in fact, a tale, that of being too much laden with idiomatic expression, a fault which the author, in the rapidity with which his mind and his utterance seem to have flowed, very naturally incurred.

In this poem his fancy ran with the most exuberant freedom. The poet enters upon his topic, and confirms his argument by a variety of illustrations. He, however, dwells upon them too long, and leaves off in such a manner, that it seems it was in his power to have said more.

The arguments of the poem are various. The works of nature, the affections, with which they exhibit themselves, the duties of Providence, and the passions of man. Of one advantage the writer has amply availed himself. The work is not only confined to any precise subject, but is included himself in all the beauty and freedom of a miscellaneous poem. Yet he has still adhered to familiarity to the general air of a sonnet, which is a fault, which the fugitive allusions into his reader, or the delicate aim with keen and playful satirical, or original on the ordinary manner of human nature, or holds up the bright picture of religious conduct, in a way which he degrades, at present, a direct just and appropriate, equal in elevation to the fervent enthusiasm of Christian rapture, and if frequently early and familiar for deceptions of doubtful life; he is alluded to in his own efforts, and descending, without means.

Not is always freer. He is especially following the mind of his own; by specific definitions, and by recollections in elevated measures, indelible objects and circumstances, a species of mock-heroic, of which *Paradise* was the first author. In this latter form of style Mr. Cowper has displayed great powers of variation, and great talents for humour. Of this, the historical account he has given of claims, in the first book of the *Fable*, is a striking specimen.

The attention, however, is the most detained by those passages in which the charms of rural life, and the endearments of domestic affection, are portrayed. It is in vain to search in any part of his poetical moderate for some peculiar touches of representation. The *Talk* abounds with incidents, introduced as episodes, and interesting an agreeable relief to the grave and serious parts of the poetry. We have admired his creative *Kate*? A description in which the calamity of a disordered reason is painted with admirable exactness and simplicity.

It is known of no poet who would have introduced to minute a circumstance into his representation; yet who is there that does not perceive that, as distresses its effect altogether from the minuteness with which it is drawn?

It was an excellent tale to point out the beauties of the poem. It is a new establishment of its reputation, and by its own merits, it has given Cowper a very high place among our national poets. Let those who cannot perceive its beauties, dwell with rapture on its defects. The title of the capability of this man is a little esteemed who, in the pride of a fallacious criticism, would be reluctant in attributing to Mr. Cowper, the praise and character of a poet, because in the title and rapidity of his fancy he has made himself a little distinguished by the use of a metaphor, or the arrangement of a word or the adjustment of a sentence.

Letters from Lisbon state, that the French Government have offered to take one half of the twenty millions of money, which they demanded of Porto, in diamonds.

The United States brig *Richmond*, has been sold at New-York for 6,250 dollars.

Capt. Dein, arrived at New-York, from Canton, brings an account of the British having raised the siege of Batavia.

The Ship *Gladiator*, of Boston, with a cargo of two hundred thousand dollars, from Buenos Ayres, has been taken by the British ship *War* of St. Albans, John Oakley, Esq. commander, and United States Consul, for adjudication. The *Super Car*, J. R. Parker, of Boston, came passenger in the packet *Lady Hobart*.

COPENHAGEN, March 31. The English fleet which fled from Yarmouth, under admiral Sir Hyde Parker and Nelson, has now made its appearance in the bay of Copenhagen, in the *Catapult*.
