This Famous Portrait, Now Reproduced for the First Time in Rotogravure, Represents Washington, the Soldier, Beside the Delaware on the Eve of the Battle of Trenton. It Was Warmly Approved by Washington Himself and Regarded by His Contemporaries as a Likeness in Face and Form of the "Happiest Fidelity," Equaling, if Not Excelling, in This Respect Even the Famous Houdon Statue at Richmond. Always a Reluctant Sitter, Washington Entered into the Painting of This Portrait with Interest, Suggesting Several Incidents Occurring on the Evening Before the Battle Which Col. Trumbull Incorporated. The Original Canvas is Now in the Gallery of the Yale School of Fine Arts
