



The famous Mazarin tapestry, bought for \$500,000 at the recent sale of the art works of the late J. P. Morgan, by P. W. French & Co. The title is, "The Triumph of Christ and the New Dispensation." The tapestry was once owned by Cardinal Mazarin, who was the ruling power in France during the minority of Louis XIV. It is said to excel in weave and perfection of texture, as well as in picture and story interest, all other known tapestries. It was woven about the year 1500. Christ sits on the throne in the upper half of the middle wing of the tapestry, His right hand raised in benediction, His left hand holding open a richly illuminated book of the Gospels.

Here Are Tapestries Sold for More Than \$700,000 at the Recent J. P. Morgan Sale.



One of the famous King of Spain tapestries, five in number, picturing the story of Don Quixote. They were designed in the first part of the reign of Louis XV., by Charles Coypel, and woven in the reign of Louis XVI., with Louis XVI. damasse grounds and border. The set was bought, by P. W. French & Co.



The "Dollfus Crucifixion," woven about the year 1525. It was originally owned by the Duke of Alva, and was in the palace of Liria, in Madrid. It was sold in 1877, in Paris, at the Berwick and Alva sale, for 25,000 francs, to Jean Dollfus. It was resold in April, 1912, for 300,000 francs, to Jacques Seligman, and bought later by Mr. Morgan. It was bought by P. W. French & Co. for \$200,000. It has been resold, but the buyer's name has not been revealed.
