yourself, or if you had a tailor make it. But if you bought it ready-made, no matter what price you paid for it, the probability is that it was sewed with cheap thread and not silk!

Many complaints have been received from women protesting against this substitution evil. This is the reason why this educational campaign has been undertaken under the auspices of the Silk Association of America.

"A garment is only as good as its seams"

Its purpose is to warn American women to examine carefully the seams in all the ready-to-wear clothing—suits, dresses, blouses, gloves, silk petticoats—even garments of the most expensive materials—silks, chiffons, velvets, woolens! To your astonishment you will find many are not sewed with silk because the manufacturer says, "Women will never know the difference!"

Many stores were ignorant of this deception until we called their attention to it. Now buyers are instructed not only to carefully examine every garment, but to write in their orders to manufacturers, "Sew all seams with silk."

"Spare the seams and spoil the gown"
